STEVE BISCIOTTI wants consistency. His goal is to have the Ravens in the playoff hunt every season, avoiding dips that plague some franchises.

The Ravens are one of only four teams (Green Bay -13, Baltimore -12, Kansas City -12 and New England -12) to earn at least 12 postseason berths in the last 17 years (2008-24), with Baltimore winning at least one game in nine of those 12 playoff campaigns. Additionally, during this span, the Ravens have compiled the NFL's third-most postseason victories (13, tied with San Francisco), and they have advanced to four AFC Championship games (2023, 2012, 2011 and 2008), winning Super Bowl XLVII in 2012.

"We're proud of what we're giving to Baltimore," Bisciotti says. "You have to make the playoffs to have the opportunity to compete for championships, and championships are our goal. We want to be a consistent winner that avoids big lulls and not being in the playoffs for any length of time."

The Ravens are part of an elite group: They are one of 16 NFL teams with multiple Super Bowl victories. Four franchises have won one title. Eight others have earned a berth in the game and lost, while four teams have never advanced to the Super Bowl. More importantly, with their Super Bowl XLVII Championship during the 2012 season, the Ravens (two), Patriots (six), Chiefs (three) and Buccaneers, Eagles, Giants and Steelers (also two each) are the only teams that have won more than one NFL title since the turn of the century in 2000.

The passionate Bisciotti, who at 65 is the NFL's fourth-youngest majority owner (Kansas City's Clark Hunt, 60, Arizona's Michael Bidwill, 60 and Washington's Josh Harris, 60), bought a minority interest in the Ravens from Art Modell in 2000, completing the purchase of the franchise on April 9, 2004.

Steve's initial investment to the team provided funds to secure free agents for the 2000 Super Bowl XXXV Championship

team. He later went on to serve the NFL for several years as a member of two important ownership committees: Broadcast and Digital Media.

When Bisciotti, now in his 26th year as an owner of the Ravens, hired Harbaugh as the team's head coach in January of 2008, some eyebrows were raised. Harbaugh had never been a head coach at any level. In fact, he had not been an NFL offensive or defensive coordinator. It was obviously the right choice. Along with the Super Bowl XLVII victory, Baltimore advanced to the playoffs in each of its first five years with Harbaugh. Now entering his 18th season in 2025, Harbaugh ties (Mike McCarthy) for the 12th-most total victories (185) by a head coach in NFL history. Additionally, Harbaugh's 13 playoff wins tie (Mike Holmgren) for the seventh most all time, while his .623 regular season winning percentage stands eighth best.

"We all saw something in John. And, you have to be willing to separate yourself from the masses — take some chances — to achieve great success," Bisciotti says of Harbaugh, who in 2019 was named NFL Coach of the Year after guiding Baltimore to a franchise-best 14-2 record. "There's probably a little bit more perception that we took a risk with John. We don't think we did."

Since taking over as the Ravens' full owner (2004), Bisciotti's teams have earned the playoffs a total of 13 times, including the AFC's No. 1 seed in both 2019 (14-2 record) and 2023 (13-4 record). His 2004 (9-7), 2013 (8-8), 2017 (9-7) and 2021 (8-9) teams were in playoff contention heading into the season's final week. Baltimore has also captured seven division crowns under Steve's leadership, and with Harbaugh at the helm (since 2008), has produced the league's third-most total victories (185, tied with Geen Bay).

Born in Philadelphia on April 10, 1960, Bisciotti moved with his family to Baltimore (Severna Park) in March of 1961 when

Steve, the youngest of three children, was 11 months old. His father, Bernard, took the children to Orioles and Colts games. Sadly, Bernard died of leukemia when Steve was 8. His mother, Patricia, a huge Ravens fan, then raised the children.

After graduating from Salisbury (Md.) State University in 1982 with a degree in liberal arts, Bisciotti worked in the temporary help industry. In 1983 (at age 23), he started Aerotek with his cousin, Jim Davis. They offered aerospace and technology companies access to skilled temporary employees.

Aerotek is part of Allegis Group, the largest staffing firm in the United States and the largest privately held talent management firm in the world. The company, headquartered iust outside Baltimore, has offices throughout North America. Europe and Asia Pacific. Allegis Group has over 15,000 internal employees and 110,000 employees assigned to client engagements. These include engineers, scientists, IT professionals, accountants, attorneys and industrial workers.

Before purchasing the Ravens, Bisciotti's business success was not well known to the public on a national level, or even notable in the Baltimore area, where he and his partners kept a low profile. "I'm OK if I'm one of the least known owners in pro sports," Bisciotti says.

Steve, an energetic visionary, is quietly dedicated to several important causes and projects, some associated with his deep Catholic faith. He is a board member for Catholic Charities and created The Stephen and Renee Bisciotti Foundation. Much of Bisciotti's extensive charity work and generous giving are done without public notice, although, in 2020, it was announced that the foundation and the Ravens combined to donate \$5 million to assist vital programs supported by Catholic Charities from more than 200 locations in Baltimore City and nine Maryland counties. In August of 2020, the foundation and the Rayens also jointly distributed \$1 million to support social justice reform in Baltimore, with a committee of current and former Ravens players determining the 28 programs chosen to receive funds from the contribution.

Additionally, at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, Steve and Renee's foundation and the Ravens combined to donate \$1 million to support four nonprofit organizations – the Fund for Educational Excellence, the United Way of Central Maryland, the Baltimore Community Foundation and the Maryland Food Bank – in their efforts to combat the public health crisis.

In June of 2021, Steve and Renee honored Ozzie Newsome the Ravens' longtime personnel executive and Pro Football Hall of Famer – by making a \$4 million gift in his name to Maryland's Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Through their foundation, the \$4 million donation created the Ozzie Newsome Scholars Program, which funds scholarships for Baltimore City Public Schools graduates who attend an HBCU in Maryland.

In January of 2023, The Stephen and Renee Bisciotti Foundation and the Ravens made a \$20 million commitment to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Metropolitan Baltimore to create the Baltimore Ravens Boys & Girls Club at Hilton Recreation Center. The previously-closed center has undergone a comprehensive renovation resulting in a space where hundreds of children ages 6-18 will participate daily in youth development programs, beginning in the winter of 2025.

In April of 2024, Steve and Renee's foundation and the Ravens announced a \$30 million donation to help form the Ravens College Access program, which benefits three organizations CollegeBound, Bridges Baltimore and College Track – dedicated to providing access to higher education.

In the spring of 2025, the foundation and Rayens provided a \$20 million grant for four Baltimore-area hospitals to grow the nursing workforce and provide support for nurses. This investment came shortly after a separate \$3.75 million Bisciotti Foundation/Ravens partnership announcement that supports Baltimore's Healthy Harbor Initiative.

Bisciotti enjoys golfing and boating. He and his wife, Renee (Foote), are the parents of two sons: Jason and Jack, both of whom reside with their families in the Baltimore area.

SASHI BROWN, who is in his fourth year with the Ravens, oversees and manages all business areas of the organization, including finances, legal, budgeting, corporate sales, operations, stadium activities, communications and business ventures. Brown was also appointed by Commissioner Roger Goodell to serve on the NFL's Stadium Committee.

"He's very smart and has good judgement," stated longtime Ravens president Dick Cass, whose role Brown assumed in April 2022. "He's thoughtful, and what you really notice are his people skills, poise and presence."

For the three years (2019-21) prior to his arrival in Baltimore, Brown worked at Monumental Sports & Entertainment, last serving as President of Monumental Basketball (Wizards, Mystics and Go-Go) and as a special advisor to the CEO.

Brown also previously accrued 13 years of NFL experience, including five seasons (2013-17) with the Cleveland Browns, where he served two years (2016-17) as executive vice president of football operations. Prior, he spent eight years (2005-12) with the Jacksonville Jaguars, last serving as senior vice president and general counsel.

In 2015, Brown was named to the *Sports Business Journal's* "Forty Under 40" list.

He began his career as an attorney at the Washington, D.C.-based law firm WilmerHale.

2022-25: (with Baltimore Ravens) 2025: Led by Brown and the organization's operations team, the Ravens debuted in July a new premium performance & wellness space at the Under Armour Performance Center, creating a world-class recovery and medical facility for players...In March and under Brown's guidance, the Ravens were granted rights in the United Kingdom as part of the NFL's Global Markets Program, providing an opportunity to grow their fanbase, expand their brand and create awareness of the game on a global level...This initiative allows the Ravens to maximize international opportunities that increase unique offerings to fans who enjoy attending games and events abroad. 2024: Spearheaded by Brown, the Ravens announced in April the creation of the Ravens College Access Program, which is supported by \$50 million in donations that benefit three organizations (College Bound, Bridges Baltimore & College Track) dedicated to providing access to higher education... The Stephen & Renee Bisciotti Foundation and the Ravens will contribute \$30 million to the three college completion programs (\$10 million to each), while M&T Bank and College Track will also provide \$10 million investments each... In conjunction with this program, the Baltimore Ravens College Track Center is expected to open in the fall of 2025... In March, the Ravens entered a partnership with Levy to become the team's official food, beverage and hospitality (F&B) partner and the exclusive concessionaire at M&T "The Ravens serve as a beacon of excellence for the community and beyond. It's a core part of our mission to be a great steward, not only a great football team on the field, which we've been, but also a great steward of the community in Maryland as a whole."

Bank Stadium. 2023: Brown led the months-long planning and December unveiling of "The Next Evolution," a threeyear (2024-26) upgrades project to significantly enhance the gameday and year-round fan offerings at M&T Bank Stadium...In addition to substantial developments on the exterior plazas, every level of the venue has undergone (or will undergo) renovations – thus completely transforming the stadium experience for all fans and ensuring that the stadium remains a world-class NFL and entertainment venue well into the future...In November, Brown oversaw the completion of a significant agreement with the Fanatics Retail Group to assume all future M&T Bank Stadium retail operations, along with the continuation of e-commerce business...The new partnership creates an omni-channel experience for Ravens fans that seamlessly integrates online and in-venue shopping...In April, Brown's leadership helped secure a new 15-year strategic partnership extension with M&T Bank, which includes the continued stadium naming rights agreement. 2022: In his first year as president, Brown led the completion of a new stadium lease agreement between the Maryland Stadium Authority and the Ravens, extending the team's commitment to remain in Baltimore and support investment in M&T Bank Stadium through the end of the 2037 NFL season (with two five-year options to extend)...Through funds from state-issued bonds, the lease agreement paved the way for M&T Bank Stadium enhancement projects over the ensuing several years.

2019-21: (with Monumental Sports & Entertainment) In November 2021, Brown was promoted to President of Monumental Basketball and special advisor to the CEO...He oversaw various operations for the Wizards, Mystics and Go-Go, including research & information systems, technology, equipment, communications, finance, facilities, security and player engagement...Originally joined Monumental Basketball as chief planning and operations officer in July 2019.

2013-17: (with Cleveland Browns) Brown was promoted to EVP of football operations in January 2016, leading the development of an organizational vision and strategic

plan for rebuilding football operations...He oversaw all football operation functions, including salary cap and contracts, scouting, medical, equipment, video, travel, security, facilities and athletic performance...Originally hired by Cleveland as its executive vice president and general counsel, Brown worked in both football and business capacities...Upon his arrival, he was responsible for overseeing the team's football administration functions and player contract negotiations...On the business side, his duties included commercial contracts, government affairs, risk management, intellectual property issues, litigation and stadium matters.

2005-12: (with Jacksonville Jaguars) Brown spent eight years as Jacksonville's senior vice president and general counsel...He was involved in both football and business operations, which included playing a key role in helping negotiate the naming rights deal for EverBank Field.

2002-05: (with WilmerHale) Brown represented clients in sports-related transactions, venture capital and private equity deals, as well as mergers and acquisitions.

COLLEGE: Brown earned his Bachelor of Arts degree (mass media) from Hampton University in 1998 and a juris doctorate degree from Harvard Law School in 2002.

PERSONAL: Brown has a longstanding history of civic involvement, having served on the boards of directors for the Cleveland Browns Foundation, Cleveland Development Advisors, Jacksonville Housing Authority, Jacksonville Museum of Science & History and the MaliVai Washington Kids Foundation...He is currently on the Board of Trustees at Hampton University and is the Chairman of the Ravens Foundation, Inc....He's also a Board Member at Lafayette Square, an organization that aims to support workingclass communities by creating investment and business opportunities....Though born in Boston, Brown mostly grew up in Middletown, CT...While attending Hampton University, he spent time as a radio play-by-play announcer and analyst for the football and basketball teams...He also hosted a radio show focused on jazz music, which he remains passionate about today...He and his wife, Paige, have two sons (Robeson & Ellison) and two daughters (Zora & Ananda).

In June 2025, Brown and the Ravens held an organization-wide volunteer day to help transform Green Street Academy. The annual "signature project" reinforced the team's long-term commitment to this West Baltimore community, as GSA sits adjacent to the Baltimore Ravens Boys & Girls Club at Hilton Recreation Center, which opens this fall.



Brown, pictured with head coach John Harbaugh (left) and owner Steve Bisciotti (right), oversees and manages all business areas of the organization, including finances, legal, budgeting, nonfootball personnel, corporate sales, operations, stadium activities, communications and business ventures.



In December 2023, Brown unveiled a series of significant projects to evolve gameday and year-round fan offerings at M&T Bank Stadium. Initial upgrades came on-line in 2024 and 2025, with the remaining enhancements set for 2026 — ensuring the stadium remains a world-class NFL and entertainment venue for years to come.



The launch of the Baltimore Ravens College Track Center (targeted to open in 2025) was announced in 2024 by the Ravens, The Stephen and Renee Bisciotti Foundation, M&T Bank and College Track. Brown's vision was instrumental in developing the partnership and the future educational opportunities that will assist Baltimore City students.

ERIC DECOSTA's loyalty, love and pride for the Baltimore Ravens are unmatched. A pillar of the organization's well-laid foundation, DeCosta has been with the franchise since Day One, first beginning as an intern during the inaugural 1996 season and then ascending to the personnel department's chief decision-maker in 2019.

Prior to being named executive vice president and general manager - succeeding the legendary Ozzie Newsome -DeCosta, 54, received GM interview offers annually from multiple teams over the years. Yet, he never seriously considered leaving Baltimore, because Eric's respect for - and thorough understanding of - the Ravens' culture aligned perfectly with his dream job.

"I'm the kind of person who appreciates people who stick with things," DeCosta admits. "Even when I think about athletes I've admired, people I've admired, they've had long tenures in different places. But I love this community. My family is from this community. I love the people I work with day to day. Anyone who knows me knows that."

In 2007, Ravens owner Steve Bisciotti first approached DeCosta about someday becoming general manager. Years later, they decided Eric would continue to serve as Newsome's top lieutenant through 2018, helping groom him for the GM role and setting up a seamless transition.

"Did I have chances [to leave]? Yes," DeCosta shares. "Did I have a lot? Yes. Did I ever really consider it? Not really, because every time I'd go to bed thinking that maybe I would consider something, I'd wake up and say, 'What are you, crazy? You know you're going to have the job someday that you've dreamed about, so just wait and make it perfect."

From an outside perspective, the imminent ascension might have spawned challenges in DeCosta's relationship with Newsome. That was never the case, however, because the duo has always had a remarkable connection – one that forged a rare professional partnership and an extraordinary friendship.

"He's an outside-the-box thinker, but his football beliefs are based on substance, history and collected wisdom. He can see the unintended consequences that come with certain big decisions. He'll push the envelope to make sure we're covering all possibilities."

"Ozzie basically took a 25-year-old kid who had no experience" in the NFL, who was so different from him, and gave me a chance and accepted me," DeCosta says fondly. "He and I have always been very different in a lot of ways, but so aligned. It's a special relationship in my life. I've learned a lot of football, but honestly, just a lot more about being a good person."

A graduate of the Ravens' "20/20 Club," which includes members of the personnel staff who started with the team as young assistants and grew into evaluators with more input, DeCosta quickly moved up the ranks. He was first a personnel intern (1996), then area scout (1997-2002), then director of college scouting (2003-08), then director of player personnel (2009-11) and then assistant GM (2012-18).

It became evident early in DeCosta's tenure that he was destined for NFL success. Brimming with passion, resourcefulness, a relentless attitude and an advanced aptitude, he quickly earned his co-workers' respect.

"When Ray Lewis walked into camp his first day, he never really was truly a rookie," former Ravens SVP of football operations Pat Moriarty recalls. "He was Ray Lewis, our starting linebacker. [That same year of 1996], I think Eric was never 'Eric the Intern.' He was more than a scout."

Raised in Taunton, MA, DeCosta set his sights on becoming an NFL GM from the age of 6. His interest first piqued in 1978, when, contrary to many of his friends who were Patriots and Broncos fans, he began to follow the Cowbovs.

"I was fascinated by the Cowboys and Tom Landry, Gil Brandt, Tex Schramm – the whole notion of scouting and building a football team," DeCosta states. "Doing things differently than

all the other teams did back then really appealed to me."

Throughout much of his upbringing, Eric would study the NFL – particularly the draft – in a detailed manner that continuously amazed friends and family members.

His passion for the game of football was also quite evident on the field. Though, admittedly, he was never the biggest, fastest, smartest or most talented athlete, DeCosta was undoubtedly the hardest worker — someone always seeking ways to make himself better and gain a competitive edge.

While attending Colby College in Maine, the undersized linebacker went on to become a three-year starter and senior captain. He knew every assignment on the gridiron, holding himself to the highest of standards, all while inspiring teammates to reach new levels.

After graduating from Colby in 1992, DeCosta took part in a graduate coaching fellowship for the football team at Trinity University, where he would also earn a master's in English. But as time passed, he became uncertain about where a coaching path would lead. Looking to maximize his options, Eric applied to law school and prepared to pursue a new career, rather than cling to his football passion.

However, a chance encounter reinvigorated DeCosta's football pursuits in 1995, when he met someone who had completed an internship with Washington's NFL team. Upon learning of such NFL opportunities, Eric immediately sent resumes and letters to all 32 clubs. In response, he received rejection notices from all but one team — Washington — which hired him to serve as a training camp intern.

Thanks to that experience, DeCosta had finally — and successfully—broken into the NFL. The following year (1996), he landed the Ravens' personnel internship during their first-ever season. Coincidentally, he accepted Baltimore's offer the same day he learned that he had been placed on the University of Connecticut Law School waitlist.

"I was willing to take a chance," DeCosta affirms, "because I knew that once I got to Baltimore, I'd do everything to make the most of my opportunity."

The rest, as they say, is history – something bolstered by loyalty, love and pride from a man who helped build an organization, just as much as the organization built him.

1996-2025: (with Baltimore) 2024: Earning their fifth playoff berth in DeCosta's six seasons as GM, the Ravens finished 12-5 and won the AFC North for the second-straight year... From 2017-20, served on the Board of Visitors at Colby before joining the Board of Trustees in December of 2020.

Including UDFA LS Morgan Cox, FB Patrick Ricard and K Justin Tucker, the Ravens have produced 22 "homegrown" AP first-team All-Pro selections since their 1996 inception.

Super Bowl-winning head coach **JOHN HARBAUGH** is in his 18th season at the Ravens' helm. The 2019 NFL Coach of the Year has led Baltimore to a playoff berth in 12 (2008-12, 2014, 2018-20 & 2022-24) of his 17 previous seasons, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second World Championship.

Though he never wants it to be about him, it's impossible to ignore Harbaugh's significant success. Here's a look at the NFL's second-longest-tenured head coach (Mike Tomlin – 19 seasons), entering the 2025 campaign:

- Harbaugh ties (Mike McCarthy) for the 12th-most total victories (185, including playoffs) by a head coach in NFL history. Additionally, his 13 playoff wins tie (Mike Holmgren) for the seventh most all time, while his .623 regular season winning percentage stands eighth best.
- Since Harbaugh's 2008 Baltimore arrival, the Ravens tie (GB) for the NFL's third-most total victories (185). He has also led the Ravens to 172 regular season wins since 2008, ranking as the league's fourth most.
- Under Harbaugh, Baltimore (12) is one of four teams (GB 13, KC 12 & NE 12) to earn a playoff berth in at least 12 of the past 17 seasons. Baltimore (six) is also one of four teams (KC seven, Buf. six & Phi. six) to make the playoffs in at least six of the past seven seasons (2018-24).
- The Ravens' 13 playoff wins since 2008 tie (SF) for the NFL's third most, trailing only Kansas City (18) and New England (16). Of those Baltimore victories, an NFL-best eight have come on the road.
- Harbaugh's 13 playoff victories tie (Mike Holmgren) for the fourth most by a head coach in the first 17 seasons of an NFL coaching career (Joe Gibbs & Bill Belichick – 17; Chuck Noll – 15).
- Harbaugh owns the most road playoff wins (eight) by a head coach in NFL history. Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) are second with seven each.
- Harbaugh is one of five coaches to earn at least 12 playoff berths in his first 17 seasons (Pete Carroll, Bud Grant, Mike Holmgren & Mike McCarthy all with 12).

- The 2012 Ravens won Super Bowl XLVII, 34-31, over the San Francisco 49ers in one of the most dramatic games in NFL history. Baltimore jumped to a 28-6 lead, but needed a critical goal-line stand late in the fourth quarter to help seal the victory. The Ravens overcame a furious secondhalf comeback and a 34-minute power outage at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in New Orleans to clinch the franchise's second World Championship.
- Under Harbaugh's guidance, the Ravens have appeared in four AFC Championship games (2008, 2011, 2012 & 2023) and have won at least one playoff game in nine of their 12 postseasons with him as head coach.
- Harbaugh is the only head coach in NFL history (since 1970 merger) to win a playoff game in each of his first five seasons. Notably, no other NFL coach has won a playoff game in each of their first four seasons at the helm. He is also the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- John and his brother, Jim (2011, 2012 & 2013), the former 49ers head coach and current Chargers head coach, are the only NFL head coaches to reach three conference championships in the first five seasons of a coaching career.
- With Harbaugh, the Ravens have posted a 99-39 mark at M&T Bank Stadium over the past 17 seasons, ranking as the NFL's second-best home winning percentage (.717) during that span (2008-24).
- In 2019, the Ravens recorded a franchise-best 14-2 record. Baltimore won a team-record 12 straight games to close out the regular season, also earning the franchise's firstever No. 1 playoff seed.
- Coach Harbaugh has led the Ravens to six AFC North Division titles (2011-12, 2018-19 & 2023-24).

From his job interview with the Ravens, to his first press conference, to his consistent action and talk about Baltimore, it is all about "the team" for Harbaugh. Signs can be seen around the Ravens' complex:

"The Team, The Team, The Team."

Despite his continued success, "Harbs" diffuses accolades: "It's about us. It's about the team. It's about the players, the coaches, Steve [Bisciotti], Ozzie [Newsome], Eric [DeCosta] and the scouts. It's about Dick [Cass], Sashi [Brown] and the support staff. It's about all of us pulling together to win — to be the best."

Unlike other NFL head coaches, "Harbs" took the road less traveled. Most NFL field bosses graduate from pro jobs that include the word "coordinator" after "offensive" or "defensive," or they emerge from leading big-time college programs. Before becoming the Ravens' head coach in 2008, John was the Eagles' secondary coach (2007), and prior to that, Philadelphia's special teams coordinator (1998-2006) and a 14-year collegiate coach. (Harbaugh grew up learning about the game from his father, Jack, a longtime college coach.)

In 1998, then-Eagles head coach Ray Rhodes hired Harbaugh, who quickly established a reputation as one of the NFL's top special teams coaches. Subsequently, he was one of four assistants retained by Andy Reid in 1999.

Prior to hiring Harbaugh, the Ravens talked with over 40 people about the energetic coach. "Did we take a chance by hiring John? My belief is that you have to be willing to do things the masses don't, or you'll never separate yourself from the masses," team owner Steve Bisciotti stated. "We obviously picked the right person."

Simply put, Harbaugh strives to be the best. "We don't want to just win a championship. We want to be a championship team," he stated. "We seek the highest levels."

ADDITIONAL RAVENS NOTES DURING HARBAUGH ERA: Maintaining a strong defensive tradition during his time in Baltimore (2008-24), Harbaugh's defense has allowed the NFL's fewest scrimmage touchdowns (525), the fewest points per game (19.1) and the second-fewest net yards per game (318.6). Under Harbaugh, the Ravens have posted a Top 5 scoring defense in 10 of his 17 seasons at the helm, including the No. 1 unit (16.5 ppg allowed) in 2023. Additionally, Baltimore has boasted 13 Top 10 defenses (yards allowed per game), including the No. 6 unit (301.4) in 2023 and the No. 10 unit (324.2) in 2024.

The Ravens' offense has also experienced record-setting success during the Harbaugh Era. In 2019, Baltimore finished No. 1 in the NFL in points (33.2) and rushing yards (206.0) per game, while it was No. 2 in total yards (407.6). In 2019, the Ravens also became the first team ever to average 200 passing and 200 rushing yards per game in a season. Baltimore also set a new NFL single-season (Super Bowl Era) rushing record (3,296 yards), besting the 1978

Patriots' 3,165. Additionally, in 2019, the Ravens set season team records for touchdowns (64, since broken in 2024), points (531), net yards (6,521, eclipsed in 2024), rushing yards (3,296) and first downs (386, eclipsed in 2021). This attack was led by unanimous NFL MVP QB Lamar Jackson, who accounted for a league-high 43 total TDs, including a league-best (and then-franchise-record) 36 passing scores. Jackson also rushed for 1,206 yards, setting a new NFL single-season record by a QB. A year later, the 2020 Ravens produced the NFL's No. 1 ground attack (191.9 ypg) again, with their 3,071 rushing yards standing as the third most in a 16-game NFL season. (The Ravens own two of the Top 3 16-game-season marks.) Producing a multifaceted attack over the past several seasons (2018-24), Baltimore has rushed for an NFL-high 171.2 yards per contest and has scored the league's second-most points per game (26.9) since Jackson's rookie campaign.

On special teams, an impressive seven Ravens have earned 17 combined Pro Bowl honors while playing for Harbaugh: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013, 2016 & 2019-23), LS Morgan Cox (2015-16 & 2019-20), P Sam Koch (2015) and RS Devin Duvernay (2021-22). A byproduct of the Ravens consistently producing one of the NFL's top special teams units during Harbaugh's tenure, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin ranked the Ravens in the Top 6 of his annual comprehensive ratings system in seven consecutive seasons (2012-18). (This includes a No. 1 ranking in 2015.) In 2021, Baltimore's special teams unit finished No. 1 in both Gosselin's rankings and Football Outsiders' DVOA ratings.

NFL ASSISTANT COACH: 1998-2007 (with Philadelphia) Harbaugh's special teams in Philadelphia were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. From 2000-05, the Eagles' units finished in the Top 10 in five of those seasons in The Dallas Morning News' special teams rankings. In 2001 and 2003, Philly ranked No. 1, according to senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin's composite ratings (includes 22 kickinggame categories).

"What separates John from a lot of different coaches is that he watches every player. He has a tremendous work ethic, he has a passion for it, and he works well [with the scouts]. He has tremendous credibility with the scouts because they know he's done the work. That's what I love; that's a joy. He has a strong opinion, but it's always backed up by the tape and by what he wants on this team, and the scouts and coaches always respect that."

Following the 2001 campaign, Harbaugh was voted the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers. He was also named The *Dallas Morning News* Special Teams Coach of the Year that season. In just four seasons (1998-2001), Harbaugh elevated the Eagles' special teams from 29th to first in the NFL.

In 1999, the Eagles signed K David Akers, who had been working as a part-time waiter after brief kicking stints with Carolina, Atlanta and Washington. With Harbaugh's help, Akers earned three Pro Bowl honors. Harbaugh also worked with P Dirk Johnson, another "street" free agent, helping him record the then-Top 2 punting averages (38.4 in 2005 and 37.4 in 2004) in Eagles history. Under "Harbs," 15 Eagles earned Special Teams Player of the Week awards, while snapper Mike Bartrum was named to the Pro Bowl, and return specialist Reno Mahe led the NFL with a 12.8-yard punt return average in 2005.

COLLEGE COACHING CAREER: Among John's 40 years of coaching is a two-year stint (1995-96) as the assistant head coach at the University of Cincinnati, finishing 6-5 both seasons with the Bearcats. He coached 10 years on offense and four on defense at the collegiate level, launching his coaching career in 1984 at the age of 21 as a graduate assistant for his father at Western Michigan. In his second position at the University of Pittsburgh (1987), he was mentored by the legendary Sid Gillman, a Pro Football Hall of Famer. John also coached the tight ends at Pitt under head coach Mike Gottfried. While at Cincinnati (1989-96), Harbaugh coached special teams, tight ends, outside linebackers and running backs, and he served as the recruiting coordinator.

Over eight years, Harbaugh recruited 27 starters for the Bearcats and tutored both the NCAA's top return man (former Raven Robert Tate, 34.3 KOR average in 1995) and the second-ranked returner (current Ravens assistant head coach/pass game coordinator Chris Hewitt, 31.5 KOR average in 1993). John was part of a staff that helped Cincinnati produce three out of four winning seasons (1993, 1995-96) for the first time in 20 years.

"Harbs" also coached one season at Indiana in 1997 as the

defensive backs coach/special teams coordinator, under former Ravens offensive coordinator Cam Cameron, and one year at Morehead State in 1988 as the defensive backs coach/special teams and strength and conditioning coordinator.

COACHING HONORS: Leading the 2019 Ravens to a franchiserecord 14-2 season and No. 1 seed in the playoffs, Harbaugh was named the Associated Press and PFWA NFL Coach of the Year. He was also named AFC Coach of the Year by the NFL 101 Awards and "Greasy" Neale Pro Coach of the Year (Maxwell Football Club) in 2019. In April 2014, Harbaugh was inducted into Miami (Ohio) University's "Cradle of Coaches Association" and was immortalized with an on-campus statue. Harbaugh's statue joins existing Cradle of Coaches statues for Earl "Red" Blaik, Paul Brown, Carm Cozza, Paul Dietzel, Weeb Ewbank, Sean McVay, Ara Parseghian, John Pont and Bo Schembechler. The Cradle of Coaches honors Miami graduates who have earned recognition as national collegiate or professional Coaches of the Year, who have been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame or the Pro Football Hall of Fame, or whose teams won national collegiate or professional/Super Bowl championships.

HARBAUGH COACHING FAMILY: Harbaugh is from a football family. His father, Jack, is a 41-year coaching veteran who won the 2002 NCAA Division I-AA football championship as the head coach at Western Kentucky. His younger brother, Jim, who was the Ravens' starting QB in 1998, played 14 seasons in the NFL, was the San Francisco 49ers' head coach from 2011-14 and led the University of Michigan to a National Championship in 2023. (The Los Angeles Chargers hired Jim as their head coach in 2024.) In a showdown that featured the first-ever NFL game between head coaches who are brothers, John's Ravens bested Jim's 49ers, 16-6, in a 2011 Thanksgiving Night primetime special. The Ravens, of course, then topped the 49ers, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII. The brothers' sister, Joani, is married to longtime collegiate basketball coach Tom Crean.

COLLEGE: Harbaugh earned a degree in political science at Miami (OH), where he won the Football Scholar Athlete Award as a defensive back for the Redhawks. He earned his master's in physical education at Western Michigan.

HARBAUGH IMMORTALIZED WITH STATUE AT ALMA MATER

In April 2014, Harbaugh was inducted into Miami (OH) University's "Cradle of Coaches Association" and was immortalized with an on-campus statue.

"I don't think you can even express what something like this means. I've been trying to figure it out," Harbaugh said. "There's nothing like Miami. There's nothing like being back here. Words can't describe my gratitude for being part of this."

Both of John's parents, Jack and Jackie (pictured at right), his brother, University of Michigan head coach Jim Harbaugh, sister, Joani, wife, Ingrid (at right), and daughter, Alison (at right), all made the trip to Oxford, Ohio.

The cross-country visit from Jim (then head coach of the 49ers) was a surprise: "There have been a lot of proud moments, but I've never been more proud of [John] than I am today," Jim said. "I always prided myself on being the tallest Harbaugh, but that all changed today when they unveiled that statue."



COMMUNITY IMPACT: Devoted to his family and Christian faith, John is most active in helping the Baltimore area be better for families. He earned the 2011 "Power of Excellence Award" from the (Ben) Carson Scholars for "demonstrating excellence in life and being a role model." He served on the board of the Port Discovery Children's Museum and is a contributor to numerous Baltimore-area events and charities. Also a willing volunteer, his wife, Ingrid, contributes to the Helping Up Mission and Sarah's House, and she is on the Board of Trustees at The Maryland Zoo in Baltimore. In 2020, the couple made significant donations to help fund the distribution of meals to healthcare workers serving on the frontlines of the COVID-19 pandemic. John and Ingrid also support Compassion International, which is an organization that aims to positively impact the long-term development of children living in poverty globally. Additionally, the couple is heavily involved in FCA Baltimore and has sponsored several Baltimore City girls' lacrosse teams, helping make the sport more available to youth who don't traditionally have much access.

Harbaugh is a strong advocate of the U.S. Military. The NFL awarded him its 2013 Salute to Service Award, acknowledging exceptional efforts by those in the league who honor and support military members. (He was also a finalist for the award in 2011.) In 2012, the late Army Chief of Staff General Raymond Odierno presented him with the Outstanding Civilian Service Award. Harbaugh has also visited numerous military installations, including bases in the Persian Gulf as part of the inaugural NFL USO Coaches Tour (2009), the Naval Special Warfare Center in Coronado, Calif., (2011), Andrews Air Force Base – just two days after the capture of Osama Bin Laden (2011) – and undisclosed locations in Turkey and Afghanistan.

In 2008, Harbaugh helped institute Military Appreciation Day – an annual event that takes place during Ravens training camp. Since its establishment, nearly 12,000 service members

have enjoyed preferred seating and opportunities to meet Ravens players and coaches. Once the season begins, Harbaugh then invites wounded warriors to be his guests at every Ravens home game. In 2017, he donated New Era hats to soldiers in Afghanistan. The hats represented all four of the major professional sports leagues and several from the NCAA. Additionally, he has purchased school supplies for children whose parents are serving in the military and has sent care packages to troops overseas.

PERSONAL: A history buff, Harbaugh has taken the Ravens to Gettysburg, Pa., during offseason team activities to learn about the Civil War. Near the end of the 2017 training camp, he surprised the entire team by cancelling practice on two occasions, loading everyone on buses to visit The Pentagon and Arlington National Cemetery and another day visit to the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, D.C. The trips were opportunities for players, coaches and staff to receive behind-the-scenes tours of the historic locations and show appreciation for what each represents.

John attended Pioneer (Ann Arbor, MI) HS, where he and his brother, Jim, were inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 2016. John and Ingrid have one daughter, Alison, a 2024 University of Notre Dame alum who played lacrosse for the Irish and at South Florida (graduate year) and is currently attending law school at Loyola University Chicago.

HARBAUGH FAST FACTS

John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in 12 (2008-12, 2014, 2018-20 & 2022-24) of his 17 seasons, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl title. In 2019, Coach Harbaugh became the first Ravens coach ever to win *Associated Press* NFL Coach of the Year Award.

Here are several more Harbaugh Quick Hits:

- Harbaugh owns the most road playoff wins (eight) by a HC in NFL history. Tom Landry (Dal.) and Tom Coughlin (Jax./NYG) are second with seven each.

- Capturing the conference's No. 3 playoff seed, the 12-5 Ravens won the AFC North for the second-straight year...Winning four straight games to close out the regular season – including three contests during an 11-day span in late December - Baltimore earned a playoff berth for the third-straight year...Following a 28-14 home victory in the Wild Card round vs. Pittsburgh, the Ravens fell, 27-25, in the Divisional round at Buffalo.
- The Ravens played a league-high 12 games vs. teams that produced a winning record for the season, with Baltimore earning victories in nine of those contests (also a league high)...The Ravens were 7-3 vs. teams that made the playoffs.

- Producing the NFL's best regular season record (13-4), the AFC North Champion Ravens earned a No. 1 playoff seed...After beating the Houston Texans, 34-10, in the Divisional Round, the Ravens fell, 17-10, at home in the AFC Championship to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs...In the regular season, the Ravens tallied an NFL-record 10 victories vs. teams that finished with a winning record, and they posted six wins over playoff teams...Baltimore also ranked No. 1 in the NFL in both point differential (+203) and turnover margin (+12, tied w/ NYG).

- With a 10-7 regular season record, the Ravens clinched a playoff berth for the fourth time (2018-20, 2022) in five seasons, earning the AFC's No. 6 seed...Baltimore finished second in the AFC North behind 12-4 Cincinnati, which played one fewer game overall...The Ravens split the regular season series with the Bengals, but then fell at Cincinnati, 24-17, in a Wild Card playoff...Despite QB Lamar Jackson (knee) missing the season's final six games and Baltimore losing both starting wideouts WR Rashod Bateman (foot, Oct. 27) and WR/RS Devin Duvernay (foot, Dec. 20) to season-ending injuries, the Ravens produced at least 10 wins for the ninth time during Harbaugh's tenure (since 2008).
- Baltimore boasted a Top 5 defense in multiple categories, including the NFL's No. 3 unit in points allowed per game (18.5)...The Ravens were also third against the run (92.1) and in defensive red zone TD% (46.4), while finishing fourth on third down (34.9%)...Baltimore allowed the NFL's ninth-fewest yards per game (324.3), tied with Tampa Bay.
- Baltimore produced the NFL's No. 2 rush offense (160.0 ypg) and racked up an NFL-high 12 games with at least 150 rushing yards...In 12 starts, QB Lamar Jackson threw for 2,242 yards, 17 TDs and 7 INTs, adding a team-high 764 rushing yards... Including Jackson, the Ravens had four players rush for 400+ yards: RB J.K. Dobbins (520), RB Kenyan Drake (482) & RB Gus Edwards (433).
- K Justin Tucker scored a single-season career-high 142 points and made an NFL-high 37 FGs, while WR Devin Duvernay posted a 103-yard KOR-TD in Week 2 vs. Mia., helping Baltimore's special teams rank No. 3 in Football Outsiders' 2022 DVOA rating.
- Seven Ravens were voted to the Pro Bowl: TE Mark Andrews (third), RS Devin Duvernay (second), CB Marlon Humphrey (third), QB Tyler Huntley (first, as an alternate), FB Patrick Ricard (fourth), LB Roquan Smith (first) and K Justin Tucker (sixth).

2021

- After starting the season with an AFC-best 8-3 record, the
 Ravens dropped their last six games five of which came by a
 combined 8 points...With its final 8-9 record, Baltimore missed
 the playoffs for the first time in four seasons and for just the
 fifth time during Harbaugh's 14-year tenure...Ravaged by
 injuries throughout the year including season-ending injuries
 to standouts RB J.K. Dobbins, RB Gus Edwards, CB Marcus
 Peters and DE Derek Wolfe prior to Week 1 projected 2021
 starters missed a combined 114 games due to injury/illness
 (this included QB Lamar Jackson, who missed five games).
- Baltimore's offense ranked No. 6 in total yards (378.8 ypg) and registered the league's No. 3 rushing attack (145.8 ypg)...

- All-Pro TE Mark Andrews was sensational, producing singleseason franchise records for receptions (107) and receiving yards (1,361)...Andrews' 1,361 receiving yards also rank third most by a TE in league history and were sixth overall in the NFL.
- Baltimore produced the NFL's No. 1 run defense (84.5 ypg) and ranked No. 3 on third down (34.8%)...On special teams, K Justin Tucker led the league in FG% (94.6) and connected on an NFL-record 66-yard game-winner at Detroit...RS Devin Duvernay finished No. 1 in the NFL in PR average (13.8) and No. 7 in KOR average (24.1), helping Baltimore's special teams rank No. 1 in Football Outsiders' DVOA ratings.
- Five Ravens players were voted to the Pro Bowl: TE Mark Andrews (second), RS Devin Duvernay (first), QB Lamar Jackson (second), FB Patrick Ricard (third) and K Justin Tucker (fifth)...Andrews, Duvernay and Tucker also each earned first-team All-Pro honors..

- The Ravens earned their third-straight playoff berth and ninth overall under Harbaugh by posting an 11-5 regular season record...As the AFC's fifth seed, Baltimore won six-straight games including a 20-13 Wild Card battle at No. 4 Tennessee before falling, 17-3, in the Divisional Round at No. 2 Buffalo to close out the 2020 campaign...The Ravens advanced to the Divisional Round of the playoffs for the eighth time during Harbaugh's 13 years at the helm.
- The Ravens' rushing attack finished No. 1 in the NFL (191.9 ypg) and produced the third-most yards (3,071) in a 16-game NFL season...Baltimore had three players QB Lamar Jackson (1,005), rookie RB J.K. Dobbins (805) & RB Gus Edwards (723) rush for over 700 yards each, while Jackson became the first QB in NFL history to surpass the 1,000-yard rushing milestone in multiple seasons...Dobbins' 6.01 ypc average ranked No. 1 among all NFL RBs, while Jackson's 6.32 ypc average was No. 1 overall...TE Mark Andrews had 58 catches for 701 yards and 7 TDs, becoming the first TE in Ravens history with multiple seasons of at least 700 receiving yards and 7 receiving TDs... WR Marquise Brown posted team highs in receiving yards (769) and receiving TDs (8) on 58 catches.
- Baltimore allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (18.9) and seventh-fewest yards (329.8) per game...The Ravens also boasted the No. 2 third-down defense (34.0%) and produced a league-high 25 FFs...CB Marlon Humphrey led the NFL with a Ravens' single-season record 8 FFs, also registering a teamhigh 11 PD...S Chuck Clark tallied 96 tackles, 2 FFs, 2 FRs, 1.5 sacks, 1 INT and 1 defensive TD, while OLB Matthew Judon led the team with 6 sacks and 21 QB hits...Rookie LB Patrick Queen posted a team-high 105 tackles and was the NFL's only defender with at least 70 tackles, 3 sacks, 2 FFs, 2 FRs, 1 INT and 1 D-TD.
- Seven Ravens players were voted to the 2020 Pro Bowl, tying the Chiefs, Packers and Seahawks for the NFL's most selections: T Orlando Brown Jr. (second), DE Calais Campbell (sixth), LS Morgan Cox (fourth), CB Marlon Humphrey (second), OLB Matthew Judon (second), FB Patrick Ricard (second) and K Justin Tucker (fourth).

2019

- The No. 1 AFC playoff seed Ravens (14-2) won a franchise-record 12-straight games to close out the regular season, before falling at home in the Divisional round, 28-12, to the Tennessee Titans...Baltimore's league-best 14-2 record set a franchise mark, topping the 13-3 campaign from 2006... The Ravens secured a playoff berth for the eighth time in Harbaugh's 12 seasons and won the AFC North for the fourth time (2011-12, 2018-19).
- The Ravens ranked No. 1 in points (33.2) and rushing yards (206.0) per game, while they were No. 2 in total yards (407.6)... Baltimore became the first team ever to average 200 passing and 200 rushing yards per game in a season...The Ravens set a new NFL single-season (Super Bowl Era) rushing record (3,296 yards), besting the 1978 Patriots' 3,165...Baltimore also set season team records for touchdowns (64, since eclipsed in 2024), points (531), net yards (6,521, broken in 2024), rushing yards (3,296) and first downs (386, eclipsed in 2021).
- Unanimous NFL MVP QB Lamar Jackson accounted for a league-high 43 total TDs, including a league-best (and thenfranchise-record) 36 passing scores...Jackson also rushed for 1,206 yards (sixth most in the league), setting a new NFL single-season record by a QB...RB Mark Ingram II posted 15 total TDs, tying a then-single-season team record and ranking fourth overall in the NFL. He also rushed for 1,018 yards.
- Baltimore allowed the NFL's third-fewest points (17.6) and fourth-fewest net yards (300.6) per game...The Ravens boasted the league's No. 5 run defense (93.4 ypg) and were No. 6 vs. the pass (207.2 ypg)...During their 12-game winning streak (starting in Week 5), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest yards (268.9) and points (15.2) per game...Baltimore allowed just 18 TDs (a league low) in its final 12 games, also scoring 6 TDs of its own during this span...OLB Matthew Judon led the team with a then-career-high 9.5 sacks and 4 FFs...CB Marlon Humphrey tallied 14 passes defensed and tied (CB Marcus Peters) for the team lead with 3 INTs.
- Thirteen Ravens were named to the Pro Bowl, tying the 2007 Cowboys for the most-ever selections on a Pro Bowl roster: TE Mark Andrews (first), T Orlando Brown Jr. (first), LS Morgan Cox (third), CB Marlon Humphrey (first), RB Mark Ingram II



(third), QB Lamar Jackson (first), QLB Matthew Judon (first), CB Marcus Peters (third), FB Patrick Ricard (first), T Ronnie Stanley (first), S Earl Thomas III (seventh), K Justin Tucker (third) and G Marshal Yanda (eighth).

2018

- Winning six of its last seven games all with rookie QB Lamar Jackson as the starter Baltimore (10-6) captured its first AFC North Division title since 2012 (and fifth ever), earning a playoff berth for the seventh time during Harbaugh's 11-year tenure... The Ravens returned to the postseason for the first time since 2014, but fell at home in the Wild Card round, 23-17, to the Los Angeles Chargers.
- The Ravens produced the NFL's No. 1 defense, allowing 292.9 yards per game...Baltimore also permitted the league's second-fewest points per game (17.9), just behind Chicago's 17.7...With 2018 Pro Bowlers LB C.J. Mosley (fourth), S Eric Weddle (sixth) and DT Brandon Williams (first), Baltimore ranked No. 1 in total defense for the second time (2006) in team history...The Ravens produced a Top 10 defense for the eighth time in Harbaugh's 11 seasons at the helm.
- Boasting the NFL's No. 2 rushing attack (152.6 ypg), Baltimore also produced a then-franchise-record 5,999 total yards...Over the team's final seven games (with Jackson as starter), the Ravens piled up an NFL-high 1,607 rushing yards (229.6 ypg)... RG Marshal Yanda earned his seventh Pro Bowl nod, helping Jackson finish with the NFL's most rushing yards (695) by a QB.
- K Justin Tucker (a Pro Bowl first alternate) made 35-of-39
 FGAs and scored a franchise-record 141 points for the thirdstraight season, becoming the NFL's only kicker to surpass the
 140 mark in each of the past three years (2016-18)...Baltimore
 ranked fifth in the NFL in punt return average (11.5), with RS
 Cyrus Jones posting the league's fourth-best mark (13.2).

- Winning six of its last nine games, Baltimore finished second in the AFC North with a 9-7 record, falling one game short of earning a playoff berth (lost on tiebreaker with Buffalo) for the seventh time in Harbaugh's 10-year tenure...The Ravens needed a home win over Cincinnati in Week 17 to make the 2017 playoffs...However, Baltimore's hopes were dashed when the Bengals produced a 49-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-12 with just 44 seconds remaining to earn a hard-fought, 31-27 victory that closed out the season in heartbreaking fashion.
- The Ravens produced NFL bests in interceptions (22), takeaways (34) and shutouts (three the most in a season since the 2003 Patriots)...Baltimore's +17 turnover differential ranked No. 1 in the NFL, while its defensive passer rating (72.4) and 5 defensive touchdowns (tied with Det. & Phi.) were each second best... Baltimore allowed just 18.9 points per game, which ranked sixth best in the league...It marked the seventh time during the John Harbaugh Era (since 2008) that the Ravens produced a Top 10 scoring "D."...Behind Pro Bowlers LB C.J. Mosley, OLB Terrell Suggs and S Eric Weddle, Baltimore's defense ranked 12th overall (325.1 ypg).

- Over the season's last nine games, Baltimore scored the NFL's second-most points per contest (29.4)...During this span, the Ravens also ranked No. 1 in fewest giveaways (5) and No. 2 in sacks allowed (10)...Baltimore finished the year ranking ninth overall in points per game (24.7) and seventh (tied) in both giveaways (17) and sacks allowed (27).
- Football Outsiders tabbed Baltimore's special teams as the NFL's No. 1 overall unit in 2017...The Ravens' ranking (9.2%) was the NFL's eighth highest in a season since 1986...In the annual special teams report from senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin, Baltimore ranked in the league's Top 5 for six-straight seasons (No. 4 in 2017)...The most accurate kicker in NFL history, K Justin Tucker connected on 34-of-37 FGAs and all 39 PATs to earn first-alternate Pro Bowl honors...P Sam Koch posted NFL bests in both punts inside the 10 (16) & 20 (40), with the 40 boots inside the 20 setting a new franchise record... Baltimore also ranked No. 1 in kickoff return average (27.5), No. 5 in punt return average (10.1) and No. 1 in opponent KOR average (18.6).

2016

- The Ravens finished second in the AFC North with an 8-8 record (4-2 in division play) behind the 11-5 Pittsburgh Steelers...The Ravens entered Game 15 at Pittsburgh with the opportunity to tie for first in the division, but dropped a dramatic 31-27 decision when the Steelers scored the winning TD with 9 seconds left... Baltimore played the NFL's second-most games (12) that were decided by 8 points or fewer...In posting a 6-2 record at M&T Bank Stadium, the Ravens boasted the NFL's No. 1 defense in both points (14.8) and yards allowed (260.3) at home.
- Through the first 12 games, Baltimore's defense ranked No. 1 in the NFL in yards allowed, and the unit finished seventh overall (322.1 ypg). (The Ravens became one of three teams Den. & Sea. to rank in the NFL's Top 10 defenses from 2014-16.)... Allowing 89.4 rushing yards per game, the Ravens ranked No. 5 vs. the run...Baltimore's ninth-ranked pass defense (232.8 ypg) tied (KC & SD) to produce the NFL's most INTs (18)...Earning his second Pro Bowl in three seasons, ILB C.J. Mosley helped the Ravens allow the league's ninth-fewest points (20.1 ppg), while free agent acquisition S Eric Weddle was spectacular in registering a team-high 4 INTs (tied with Mosley) and a career-high 13 PD.
- QB Joe Flacco set a single-season franchise record by throwing for 4,317 yards, adding 20 TDs...TE Dennis Pitta produced 729 receiving yards while leading the NFL in catches (86) by a TE... Pro Bowl FB Kyle Juszczyk led the league in receptions (37) and receiving yards (266) by a fullback, while also serving as a lead blocker for RB Terrance West (774 yards)...G Marshal Yanda earned his sixth-consecutive Pro Bowl honor, marking the thenlongest active streak among NFL guards, and C Jeremy Zuttah was selected to the All-Star game as an alternate.
- In earning his second Pro Bowl and becoming a unanimous first-team All-Pro selection, K Justin Tucker produced perhaps the greatest season ever by an NFL kicker...Tucker scored a single-season franchise-record 141 points, connecting on 38-of-

39 FGs (lone miss was a block) and 27-of-27 PATs...Tucker's 38 FGs ranked first in the NFL, while he was 10-for-10 from 50-plus yards, tying (Blair Walsh, 2012 and Brandon McManus, 2020) for the most such kicks in NFL single-season history...Amazingly, an NFL single-season record 24 of Tucker's 38 FGs made came from 40 yards or beyond (he was 24-of-24 on such boots)...LS Morgan Cox earned his second-straight Pro Bowl invitation.

2015

- The Ravens finished third in the highly-competitive AFC North, posting a 5-11 record...It marked just the second time Baltimore did not make the playoffs in Harbaugh's eight seasons...The Ravens had 20 players on Injured Reserve (NFL's second most), including eight key starters (DE Chris Canty, QB Joe Flacco, RB Justin Forsett, TE Crockett Gillmore, T Eugene Monroe, WR Steve Smith Sr., OLB Terrell Suggs and C Jeremy Zuttah)...Baltimore played an NFL-record 14 games decided by 8 points or fewer (tied, 1994 NY Giants & 2021 Vikings) and played an NFL-high (tied, Chicago) seven games decided by 3 points or fewer (4-3 record).
- Despite starting four different QBs (Joe Flacco, Matt Schaub, Jimmy Clausen & Ryan Mallett) for the first time in franchise history, Baltimore posted the then-second-most total net yards (5,749) in team annals...The Ravens also set a franchise record by averaging 266.9 passing yards per game, thanks in part to a unit that allowed the NFL's third-fewest sacks (24)...Leading the O-line was G Marshal Yanda, who earned his fifth-straight Pro Bowl nod...WR Kamar Aiken finished with team highs in catches (75), receiving yards (944) and receiving TDs (5).
- The Ravens boasted the NFL's top overall special teams unit, ranking No. 1 in both senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive ratings system and the Pro Football Focus rankings It was Baltimore's fourth-straight ranking in Gosselin's Top 5...P Sam Koch and LS Morgan Cox (a "need" player) earned their first Pro Bowl honors, with Koch posting a 42.9 net average (second in the NFL) and allowing 5.0 yards per return (the NFL's second-best figure)...The Ravens blocked a kick (2 PATs, 2 FGs and 1 punt) in five-straight contests, a feat that had not been accomplished since 1983 (Atlanta)...Baltimore's 5 blocked kicks in 2015 tied (Oakland) for the NFL's most.
- The Ravens ranked No. 8 in total defense, marking the 11th time the unit finished in the NFL's Top 10 in 13 seasons (2003-15)...In the season's final eight games, Baltimore posted the NFL's No. 2 overall defense and the No. 1 pass defense... Second-year LB C.J. Mosley tallied 116 tackles, 4 sacks and 7 PD, adding 1 FF and a 41-yard FR-TD...OLB Elvis Dumervil, whose leadership was valuable in the absence of OLB Terrell Suggs (Achilles tear), posted a team-high 6 sacks and made the Pro Bowl as an alternate.

2014

 The Ravens produced a 10-6 regular season record, earning their sixth playoff berth in seven seasons...Baltimore, one of three AFC North teams to make the postseason, finished third in the division behind Pittsburgh (11-5) and Cincinnati (10-5-1), but advanced to the Divisional Playoff round after capturing a 30-17

Wild Card victory in the Steel City...The Ravens' bid to reach their fourth AFC Championship game under Harbaugh was cut short in New England, where Baltimore fell to the Patriots, 35-31, after holding two 14-point leads during a thrilling battle.

- The Ravens set then-single-season franchise records by scoring 409 points and producing 5,838 yards of offense... Baltimore gave up just 19 sacks (second fewest in team history), which ranked only behind Denver's 17 as the NFL's fewest allowed...QB Joe Flacco tallied career bests in yards (3,986, since surpassed) and touchdown passes (27), while key free agent addition WR Steve Smith Sr. reached the 1,000-yard receiving milestone for the eighth time in his career (1,065 yards on 79 catches)...WR Torrey Smith posted 11 receiving TDs, the second most in Ravens single-season history...First-time Pro Bowl RB Justin Forsett produced a career-high 1,266 rushing yards (the NFL's fifth most) and led the league in runs of 20-plus yards (a team-record 17)...Forsett's single-season franchise-record 5.4 rushing average also ranked as the NFL's No. 1 mark among running backs.
- Led by OLB Terrell Suggs and 2014 Pro Bowl selections OLB Elvis Dumervil and rookie LB C.J. Mosley, Baltimore racked up the NFL's second-most sacks (49, tied with Philadelphia), boasted the No. 2 red zone defense (42.6) and allowed the fourth-fewest rushing yards per game (88.3).
- P Sam Koch produced the NFL's No. 3 gross average (47.4) and No. 1 net average (43.3), setting the Ravens' single-season record for each...Highlighted by his third-career 108-yard KORTD, RS Jacoby Jones ranked second in the NFL in KOR average (30.6)...As a team, the Ravens were No. 1 in the league with a 28.3-yard KOR mark.

2013

- For the first time since Harbaugh's 2008 arrival, Baltimore did not make the playoffs, falling one game short with an 8-8 mark and placing third in the AFC North...Baltimore played an NFL-high nine games decided by 3 points or fewer, compiling a 5-4 record in those contests...How close were the Ravens to making the playoffs? They were tied 17-17 near the end of the third quarter in the season-ending loss at Cincinnati, needing a victory to secure what would have been their sixth-straight postseason berth.
- OLB Terrell Suggs (10) and OLB Elvis Dumervil (9.5) combined for 19.5 sacks, with Suggs earning his sixth Pro Bowl invite...
 NT Haloti Ngata was elected to his fifth Pro Bowl, while CB Lardarius Webb's 22 PD ranked as the NFL's second most.
- WR Torrey Smith tallied 1,128 receiving yards, the then-second most in single-season team history (Michael Jackson 1,201 in 1996) and had a career-high 65 catches, posting the NFL's fifth-best yards-per-catch average (17.4)...Undrafted rookie WR Marlon Brown's 7 receiving TDs tied (Torrey Smith, 2011 and Marquise Brown, 2019) for the most by a rookie in team history, while he also finished second (Smith, 2011) in catches (49) and receiving yards (524) by a Ravens' rookie (those marks have since been eclipsed)...G Marshal Yanda also earned his third Pro Bowl honor.

 Pro Bowl K Justin Tucker set franchise records in FGs made (38, later tied in 2016) and FGs attempted (41) and produced a thenfranchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL)...Tucker also had 6 FGs of 50-plus yards and kicked 3 game-winning FGs, including a then-team-record 61-yarder at Detroit.

- The Ravens captured a second-consecutive AFC North title with a 10-6 mark before sweeping four playoff games to win Super Bowl XLVII: 24-9 over the visiting Colts on Wild Card weekend; 38-35 in double overtime at Denver in the Divisional Round; 28-13 at New England in the AFC Championship shutting out the Patriots, who owned the league's top offense, in the second half; and then topping the 49ers, 34-31, in New Orleans at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome after jumping to a 28-6 third-quarter lead...Showing a resolve that was a hallmark of that championship team, the Ravens overcame a three-game December losing streak and 53 games lost to defensive starters to win the title.
- Baltimore set a then-franchise record by scoring 398 points, averaging the NFL's 10th-most points per game (24.9)...
 The Ravens scored a then-team-record 254 points at home, producing the NFL's fourth-best home average of 31.8 ppg...
 Baltimore also surrendered just 16 giveaways, setting a thenfranchise single-season record low.
- The Ravens' special teams units were spectacular: In addition to posting a league-best (tied, Darius Reynaud) 3 kick return TDs (108- & 105-yard KORs and 63-yard PR), WR/RS Jacoby Jones led the NFL in KOR average (30.7)...Rookie K Justin Tucker, an undrafted free agent signing, made 30-of-33 FGAs (90.9%), producing the then-second-best success rate in Ravens single-season history and the then-second-best mark by a rookie kicker in NFL history.
- Six Ravens earned Pro Bowl honors: S Ed Reed (ninth), DT Haloti Ngata (fourth), FB Vonta Leach (third), RB Ray Rice (third), G Marshal Yanda (second) and Jones (first).
- En route to winning Super Bowl XLVII, the Ravens produced one of the most electrifying postseasons in NFL history by averaging 410.3 yards of offense per game (134.8 rush & 275.5 pass), scoring 31.0 points per contest and allowing just 22.0...
 WR Anguan Boldin recorded 22 catches for 380 yards and 4



TDs, while Jones posted a 29.4-yard receiving average (5 for 147), catching TDs of 70 and 56 yards (Jones also had a 108-yard KOR-TD in the Super Bowl.)...With a 3-TD performance vs. the 49ers, QB Joe Flacco threw 11 TD passes in the postseason, tying the NFL single-postseason record shared by Joe Montana (1989) and Kurt Warner (2008) and since achieved by Patrick Mahomes (2021)...Flacco finished the Super Bowl 22-of-33 for 287 yards to produce a 124.2 rating (the then-eighth-best mark in SB history) and earned game MVP honors...The Ravens' defense was also stout during the playoffs, registering 10 takeaways (6 INTs and 4 FRs) to produce a +6 turnover differential.

2011

- Producing a second-straight 12-4 record (13-5 overall),
 Baltimore won the AFC North, sweeping the division for the
 first time in team history...The Ravens were 6-0 against playoff
 teams (7-1 including postseason), matching Green Bay as the
 only clubs to go undefeated in division play and against other
 postseason qualifiers...In what was a franchise first, the
 Ravens also went unbeaten at home (9-0 with a playoff win
 over Houston)...Baltimore earned a 20-13 Divisional Round
 victory over the Texans, and then fell, 23-20, in a heartbreaking
 AFC Championship thriller at New England.
- The Ravens' defense, which finished No. 3 in the league in fewest points permitted (16.6) for the fourth-straight year, tied an NFL record for consecutive seasons of being in the Top 3 for points allowed (record has since been eclipsed by Seattle's streak of five straight from 2012-16).
- RB Ray Rice produced a career-high and NFL-best 2,068 yards from scrimmage, ranking second in rushing (1,364)...Rice also set a team mark with 15 total TDs (since tied by Mark Ingram II in 2019)...WR Torrey Smith was third among NFL rookies with 841 receiving yards (50 catches); his receptions and yards, plus 7 TDs, set then-Ravens first-year standards.
- Eight Ravens earned Pro Bowl honors: LB Ray Lewis (13th), S Ed Reed (eighth), OLB Terrell Suggs (fifth), DT Haloti Ngata (third), FB Vonta Leach (second), Rice (second), G Ben Grubbs (first) and G Marshal Yanda (first)...Suggs was also named the 2011 Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year, marking the fourth time a Raven has won the honor (Reed 2004 and Lewis 2003 & 2000).

2010

- Baltimore tied Pittsburgh for the best record in the division at 12-4, but lost the AFC North on the division-record tiebreaker (5-1 to 4-2)...Baltimore, Indianapolis (a then-NFL record nine in a row) and Philadelphia became the only teams to make the playoffs from 2008-10...The 2010 campaign also marked the first time the Ravens ever earned the postseason three years in a row (the Ravens later extended their record to five years in 2012).
- In the Wild Card game at Kansas City, the Ravens prevailed 30-7...Baltimore then dropped a 31-24 Divisional Round contest at Pittsburgh, which advanced to the Super Bowl...

- Harbaugh became the first head coach in NFL history to take over a sub-.500 team and then win a playoff game in each of his first three seasons (2008-10).
- Five Ravens earned Pro Bowl honors: K Billy Cundiff (first), LB Ray Lewis (12th), DT Haloti Ngata (second), S Ed Reed (seventh) and OLB Terrell Suggs (fourth)...WR Anquan Boldin tallied team highs with 64 catches and 837 receiving yards, while QB Joe Flacco threw 25 TD passes and a career-high passer rating (93.6)...RB Ray Rice finished with 1,776 yards from scrimmage, the NFL's third most.

2009

- After posting a 9-7 record, the Ravens produced their sixth playoff team of the decade (2000-09)...Behind the NFL's ninthranked scoring offense (24.4 ppg) and a defense that finished third in total yards (300.5 ypg) and points allowed (16.3 ppg), the Ravens upended the Patriots (33-14) in the Wild Card round, becoming the first road team to win a playoff game at New England since 1978.
- For the first time in team history, Baltimore had a 3,000-yard passer (Joe Flacco - 3,613), 1,000-yard rusher (Ray Rice - 1,339) and 1,000-yard receiver (Derrick Mason - 1,028) in the same season.
- Five Ravens were voted into the Pro Bowl, including LB Ray Lewis (11th), FB Le'Ron McClain (second), DT Haloti Ngata (first), S Ed Reed (sixth) and Rice (first), who tallied the NFL's second-most yards from scrimmage (2,041)...Rookie T Michael Oher, who started all 16 games, finished second for Diet Pepsi Rookie of the Year (NFL.com fan vote) and earned All-Rookie team honors.

- In Harbaugh's initial Baltimore season, the Ravens produced an 11-5 record and advanced to the AFC Championship game... Baltimore won the Wild Card game at Miami (27-9) and the Divisional game at the AFC's top-seeded Tennessee Titans, 13-10...Pittsburgh, the eventual Super Bowl champion, stopped the Ravens (23-14) in the AFC title matchup at Heinz Field...This first Harbaugh/Ravens team tied the NFL record (since 1978) for turnarounds by a head coach taking over a sub-.500 team... The Ravens' 2-1 playoff record following that regular season campaign established a new league standard in this same category...With the 13 total victories in 2008, Harbaugh set the NFL record for the most wins ever by a rookie head coach starting a rookie quarterback (Joe Flacco).
- Baltimore's stifling defense ranked No. 2 in the NFL by allowing 261.1 yards per game and was No. 3 in points allowed per game (15.3)...The Ravens also produced an NFL-best 26 INTs, including five returned for touchdowns...S Ed Reed tied his career high (2004) with a league-leading 9 INTs.
- Five players earned Pro Bowl honors: LB Ray Lewis (10th), Reed (fifth), ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (third), OLB Terrell Suggs (third) and FB Le'Ron McClain (first)...Flacco, who became the first rookie QB ever to win two playoff games, was named the Diet Pepsi Rookie of the Year (NFL.com fan vote).

CHRIS HORTON is in his seventh season leading the Ravens' exceptional special teams group. Since joining the team in 2014, Horton has helped Baltimore's units perform at a consistently high level. Prior to coaching, Horton, a seventh-round selection in the 2008 NFL Draft, played safety for three seasons with Washington (2008-10).

- Horton has helped coach four Pro Bowl Ravens: LS Morgan Cox (2015, 2016, 2019-20), RS Devin Duvernay (2021-22), K Justin Tucker (2013, 2016, 2019-23) and P Sam Koch (2015).
- Since 2019, Baltimore ranks in the Top 10 in several special teams categories, including yards per punt return (11.1, second), punt returns of 20+ yards (19, fourth), opponent yards per kickoff return (22.0, sixth) and kick return TDs (three, tied for sixth).
- In Football Outsiders' annual special teams DVOA ratings, a metric for analyzing each play against NFL averages based on several variables, Baltimore finished in the Top 10 each year from 2012-23, with 10 Top 5 finishes, nine Top 3 finishes and the No. 1-overall spot four times...Since 2015, when Horton joined the special teams staff, the unit has posted seven Top 5 marks and six Top 3 marks, with three No. 1 finishes...Baltimore's special teams finished ninth in Horton's first year leading the group (2019) and posted a Top 3 mark in each of the next four seasons with a No. 2 ranking in 2020, No. 1 ranking in 2021, No. 3 ranking in 2022 and No. 3 ranking in 2023.

2014-24: (with Baltimore) 2024: P Jordan Stout recorded a career-high 41.2 net average, while his 70-yard punts at Pit. (11/17) and vs. Cle. (1/4/25) were personal bests...K Justin Tucker's 126 points gave him 1,775 career points, which marked the most by any player through the first 13 seasons of an NFL career...Additionally, Tucker's career-high and franchise-record 60 PATs ranked No. 2 in the league. 2023: Baltimore's special teams ranked No. 3 in *Football Outsiders'* DVOA rating...En route to earning his seventh-career Pro Bowl honor, Tucker connected on 32-of-37 FGs (86.5%) and 51-of-52 PATs for a career-high and Ravens single-season record 147 points, a figure that also ranked No. 2 in the NFL...Stout punted 66 times for 3,158 yards, averaging a franchise-record 47.8 gross yards per punt, while pinning 28 inside the 20-yard line with only 5 touchbacks...WR Tylan Wallace tallied a game-winning 76-yard PR-TD vs. LAR (12/10/23), marking the fourth OT PR-TD in NFL history. **2022**: Baltimore's special teams ranked No. 3 in Football Outsiders' DVOA rating...Tucker scored a single-season career-high 142 points and made an NFL-high 37 FGs, en route to his sixth-career Pro Bowl...WR Devin Duvernay, selected as the AFC Pro Bowl return specialist, posted a 103-yard KOR-TD in Week 2 vs. Mia. (9/18)...It marked the first time in franchise history that Baltimore returned the game's opening kickoff for a TD...LS Nick Moore was also named an AP second-team All-Pro. 2021: Baltimore's special teams ranked No. 1 in Football Outsiders' DVOA ratings...Tucker earned his fifth Pro Bowl honor, led the league in FG% (94.6) and connected on an NFL-record 66-yard game-winner at Detroit...He was a perfect 6-for-6 on FGAs of 50+ yards...WR/RS Duvernay earned first-team All-Pro honors and his first Pro Bowl nod after

finishing No. 1 in the NFL in PR average (13.8) and No. 7 in KOR average (24.1)...He led all NFL players with 6 PRs gaining 20-plus yards. 2020: Tucker earned his fourth Pro Bowl after connecting on 26-of-29 FGAs, including a 55-yard game-winner at Cleveland...Rookie WR/RS Duvernay returned a kickoff 93 yards for a TD, marking 1 of only 7 KOR-TDs during the 2020 NFL season...Duvernay became the fifth Ravens rookie and the youngest Raven (23 years, 16 days) in franchise history to register a KOR-TD...Baltimore's 26.7 KOR average ranked as the NFL's second-best mark in 2020...P Sam Koch was the NFL's only punter to have at least 20 punts downed inside the 20 (22) with no more than 1 TB...LS Morgan Cox was named first-team All-Pro and earned his fourth Pro Bowl...Rookie WR James Proche II earned PFWA All-Rookie special teams honors. 2019: Ravens recorded a franchise-best 14-2 record en route to their secondstraight AFC North title...Tucker earned first-team All-Pro honors and his third Pro Bowl nod after converting 28-of-29 FGAs (96.6%) and scoring 141 points for the fourth-straight season. 2018: Tucker made 35-of-39 FGAs (his misses were from 53 and 65 vards, and he had 2 kicks blocked). **2017:** Football Outsiders tabbed Baltimore's special teams as the NFL's No. 1 overall unit...Ravens ranked No. 1 in KOR average (27.5), No. 5 in PR average (10.1) and No. 1 in opponent KOR average (18.6)...Koch posted NFL bests in both punts inside the 10 (16) and 20 (40). 2016: Tucker and Cox each earned their second Pro Bowl honors...Baltimore had an NFL-high 4 (tied, Mia.) blocked kicks. **2015:** Horton worked as a staff assistant alongside special teams coordinator/assistant head coach Jerry Rosburg with the Ravens' special teams...Baltimore was third in the NFL in punt return average (11.3), while allowing the second-fewest yards per punt return (5.0)...Koch and Cox each earned their first Pro Bowls...Ravens blocked a kick (2 PATs, 2 FGs and 1 punt) in five straight contests, a feat that had not been accomplished since 1983 (Atlanta Falcons)...The 5 blocked kicks tied (Oak.) for most in 2015. **2014:** Worked primarily with the Ravens' OLBs...Baltimore racked up the NFL's second-most sacks (49, tied with Philly)...OLB Elvis Dumervil (a franchise-record 17 sacks) and OLB Terrell Suggs (12) combined to produce the most sacks (29) among NFL duos.

2012-13: (with UCLA) **2013:** Bruins earned a 10-3 record and defeated Virginia Tech in the Sun Bowl, 42-12. **2012:** Joined his alma mater as a quality control coach, assisting with both the defense and special teams under head coach Jim Mora Jr.

2013: (with Seattle) Spent training camp as a coaching intern.

NFL PLAYER (2008-10): Played three NFL seasons after being drafted in the seventh round by Washington in 2008...As a rookie, Horton earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors following a Week 2 performance vs. New Orleans in which he posted 2 INTs and 1 FR...Also earned NFC Defensive Rookie of the Month (September) honors...Played in 29 career NFL games, but was hampered by injuries in his final three seasons, eventually concluding his playing career after a training camp stint with the New York Giants in 2012.

TODD MONKEN is in his 37th season coaching, including his 11th at the pro level, seventh coordinating NFL offenses and third leading Baltimore's high-powered unit. Over his first two years (2023-24) in Baltimore, Monken has taken the Ravens' offense to an elite level, with the unit ranking first in red zone TD pct. (67.9), rushing yards per game (172.1) and passer rating (110.8) and second in points per game (28.4), yards per play (6.3) and total yards per game (397.6) during this span. He previously led NFL attacks for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2016-18) and Cleveland Browns (2019). He also coached the Jacksonville Jaguars' wide receivers from 2007-10. Prior to his 2023 Charm City arrival, Monken served as the University of Georgia's offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach (2020-22), helping guide the Bulldogs to back-to-back national championships (2021-22). His 26-year collegiate coaching career also includes a stint as Southern Mississippi's head coach (2013-15) and duties as the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma State (2011-12) and Eastern Michigan (1998-99).

ZACH ORR enters his ninth year as an NFL coach and second as the Ravens' defensive coordinator following two seasons (2022-23) as the team's inside linebackers coach. Prior to rejoining Baltimore, Orr spent one season (2021) as the Jacksonville Jaguars' outside linebackers coach. He has served in various roles on Baltimore's coaching staff since transitioning to coaching in 2017, following his retirement from the NFL due to a congenital neck/spine condition. Orr originally signed as a rookie free agent ILB with the Ravens in 2014 and went on to earn second-team All-Pro honors in 2016.

- In his first year as defensive coordinator (2024), Baltimore ranked Top 10 in several categories, including rush defense (80.1 ypg, first), yards per rush (3.6, first), sacks (54, second), QB hits (115, second), yards per play (5.2, sixth), scoring (21.2 ppg, ninth) and total defense (324.1 ypg, 10th)...The unit produced five Pro Bowlers (S Kyle Hamilton, CB Marlon Humphrey, DT Nnamdi Madubuike, ILB Roquan Smith and OLB Kyle Van Noy), two AP first-team All-Pros (Humphrey and Smith) and one AP second-team All-Pro (Hamilton).
- As inside linebackers coach (2022-23), Orr guided ILBs Roquan Smith and Patrick Queen to career years, also helping them become anchors of Baltimore's defense...During this two-season span, the Ravens' unit ranked Top 10 in yards allowed per game (312.8, sixth), rushing yards allowed per game (100.8, fifth), passing yards allowed per game (212.1, ninth), points allowed per game (17.5, second), opponent third-down conversion percentage (35.7%, third), opponent red zone efficiency (43.8%, first) and takeaways (56, fourth).
- The 2023 Ravens' defense became the first unit in NFL history to lead the league in scoring (16.5 ppg), sacks (60) and takeaways (31)...ILB Roquan Smith became just the third player in NFL history to register at least 100 tackles and 1 INT in each of the first six seasons of a career (2018-23).

2022-24: (with Baltimore) **2024:** Baltimore ranked Top 10 in several categories, including rush defense (80.1 ypg, first), yards per rush (3.6, first), sacks (54, second), QB hits (115, second), yards per play (5.2, sixth), scoring (21.2 ppg, ninth) and total defense (324.1 ypg, 10th)...Baltimore was the NFL's No. 1 defense in nearly every major statistical category from Weeks 11-17 (last seven games)...OLBs Kyle Van Noy (12.5) and Odafe Oweh (10) each set career highs in sacks, becoming the first pair of Ravens teammates since 2014 to record double-digit sacks in the same season...CB Marlon Humphrey's career-best 6 INTs led all AFC defenders...CB Nate Wiggins' franchise-rookie-record 13 PD were the second most among 2024 rookies...The Ravens' defense produced five Pro Bowlers (S Kyle Hamilton, Humphrey, DT Nnamdi Madubuike, ILB Roquan Smith and Van Noy), two AP first-team All-Pros (Humphrey and Smith) and one AP secondteam All-Pro (Hamilton). 2023: Smith and Patrick Queen formed the NFL's only duo to each post at least 130 tackles while manning the middle of a historic Ravens defense that became the first unit ever to lead the league in scoring (16.5 ppg), sacks (60) and takeaways (31)...Smith earned his second-consecutive Pro Bowl nod and AP first-team All-Pro honors, while Queen was selected to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. 2022: The Ravens' inside linebackers unit helped Baltimore's "D" rank in the Top 5 in multiple categories, including No. 3 in points allowed per game (18.5)...Smith, acquired midseason by the Ravens, registered 86 tackles, 2 sacks, 1 INT and 3 PD in nine games for Baltimore, en route to his first Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors...Queen set career highs in tackles (117), sacks (5) QBHs (14), INTs (2) and PD (6).

2021: (with Jacksonville) The Jaguars finished in the AFC's Top 10 in total defense (353.1 ypg) and pass defense (227.9 ypg), while also producing the fourth-most QBHs (81) in franchise history...OLB Josh Allen registered 71 tackles, a team-high 7.5 sacks and career-high 12 TFL...Orr joined the Jaguars' coaching staff as outside linebackers coach.

A 26-year coaching veteran, **WILLIE TAGGART** is in his third season as the Ravens' running backs coach, adding the assistant head coach title in 2025. Prior to his 2023 Baltimore arrival, Taggart held head coach titles at five Division I programs (Florida Atlantic – 2020-22; Florida State – 2018-19; Oregon – 2017; South Florida – 2013-16; Western Kentucky – 2010-12). He also previously served as Stanford's running backs coach (2007-09) and in various offensive roles for his alma mater, Western Kentucky (1999-2006).

- In 2024, Taggart's RBs group led the NFL in yards per rush (5.6) and rushes of 20-plus yards (21), while also finishing Top 5 in rushing yards (2,210, third), scrimmage yards (2,814, third), total TDs (22, tied third) and rushing TDs (17, tied fifth) among all RB rooms.
- In his first season coaching Ravens' running backs, Taggart's unit posted the third-most rushing TDs (20) and the eighthmost rushing yards (1,696) among all RBs rooms in 2023.
- As a head coach, Taggart guided Florida Atlantic to the 2020 Montgomery Bowl and South Florida to the 2015 Miami Beach Bowl.
- In 2016, Taggart led a 10-2 South Florida team that finished the season ranked (No. 19) for the first time in school history.

RANDY BROWN is in his 18th season on the Ravens' special teams staff. Originally joining Baltimore in 2008 as a kicking consultant, Brown has worked with John Harbaugh since beginning his coaching career with the Eagles in 2004.

- Brown has helped coach six Pro Bowl Ravens: LS Morgan Cox (2015, 2016, 2019-20), RS Devin Duvernay (2021-22), K Justin Tucker (2013, 2016, 2019-23), P Sam Koch (2015), K Billy Cundiff (2010) and K Matt Stover (last kicked for the Ravens in 2008 but earned All-Star honors in 2000 prior to Brown's arrival).
- Under Brown's guidance (2012-24), Tucker ranked as the most accurate kicker in NFL history (417-of-468 89.1%)...Tucker's 471 FGM and 1,775 career points are the most in Ravens history...Since his initial NFL campaign in 2012 (Baltimore's Super Bowl XLVII Championship season), Tucker owns the NFL's most FGM (417) and points scored (1,775).
- In the annual special teams DVOA (Defense-adjusted Value Over Average) ratings from Football Outsiders, a popular metric for analyzing and comparing each play to the league average based on a number of variables, Baltimore finished in the Top 10 each year from 2012-23, including the No. 1 overall rating in an NFL-high four seasons (2012, 2015, 2017 & 2021) and a current streak of four consecutive Top 3 marks (2020-23).

DONALD D'ALESIO joined the Ravens as the defensive backs coach in 2025, spending the past five seasons coaching within the Kansas City Chiefs' defense (safeties, 2022-24, and defensive assistant, 2021). D'Alesio was a defensive analyst at LSU (2020) after starting his coaching career at his alma mater, Youngstown State (2015-19), assisting the Penguins' defense in various roles.

- During his time with the Chiefs, D'Alesio contributed to defenses that won three consecutive conference championships (2022-24) and two Super Bowls (2022-23).
- In 2023, D'Alesio assisted a Chiefs' defense that surrendered its fewest passing yards per game (176.5) since 1992 (158.6).

GEORGE GODSEY (pronounced GOD-see) is in his 15th NFL season and his fourth as the Ravens' tight ends coach. He leads one of the top tight ends groups in the NFL. Godsey has been an NFL offensive coordinator for two NFL teams — the Miami Dolphins (2021), where he was a co-offensive coordinator, and the Houston Texans (2015-16). He has also held offensive positions with the Dolphins (2019-20), Detroit Lions (2017-18), Texans (2014) and New England Patriots (2011-13). Prior to joining the NFL ranks, Godsey began his coaching career with the University of Central Florida (2004-10).

- In 2024, Godsey's unit led all NFL TEs rooms in receiving TDs (18) for the second-straight season, while also ranking Top 10 in yards per catch (12.1, third), receiving yards (1,281, fourth), receiving first downs (69, fourth) and receptions (106, ninth).
- The Ravens' tight ends led the NFL in receiving TDs (12) in 2023, contributing to the fourth-best scoring offense (28.4 ppg) and the sixth-ranked offense in total yards (370.4 ypg).
- In his first year in Baltimore (2022), Godsey's unit ranked No. 2 in the NFL in receiving yards (1,418), receptions (127) and first downs (76).

DENNIS JOHNSON is in his second season as the Ravens' defensive line coach. Prior to his arrival in Baltimore, Johnson guided Baylor's defensive line for four years (2020-23) after spending six seasons (2014-19) at his alma mater, LSU, assisting the defense in various capacities. His coaching career began as a graduate assistant in 2012 at Northwestern State, where he worked with the linebackers and secondary for two seasons.

- In 2024, Baltimore's defense allowed the NFL's fewest rush yards per game (80.1), yards per rush (3.6) and opponent rushing first downs (69), while also ranking No. 2 in both sacks (54) and QB hits (115)...DL Nnamdi Madubuike was selected to his second-straight Pro Bowl.
- Reached the college national title game as both an analyst (2019) and player (2011) for LSU, helping the Tigers claim victory in the 2020 College Football Playoff National Championship.
- Helped the 2021 Baylor unit rank No. 2 in the Big 12 Conference and among the Top 17 nationally in various defensive categories, including rush defense (118.4 ypg), scoring defense (18.3 ppg) and sacks (44).

2024: (with Baltimore) Baltimore's defense allowed the NFL's fewest rush yards per game (80.1), yards per rush (3.6) and opponent rushing first downs (69), while also ranking No. 2 in both sacks (54) and QB hits (115)...Under Johnson's guidance, DL Nnamdi Madubuike posted 6.5 sacks and 11 TFL, en route to his second-straight Pro Bowl nod.

GREG LEWIS is in his 11th season as an NFL coach and third season guiding Baltimore's wide receivers. Prior to his Charm City arrival in 2023, Lewis worked with the Chiefs running backs (2021-22) and wide receivers (2017-20). His professional coaching career also includes stops as wide receivers coach in Philadelphia (2016) and as an offensive assistant in New Orleans (2015). CHUCK PAGANO returns to the Ravens in 2025 as Baltimore's senior secondary coach boasting more than 35 years of coaching experience. Pagano, who was retired from coaching for the past four years, most recently served as the Chicago Bears' defensive coordinator (2019-20). He was head coach of the Indianapolis Colts for six seasons (2012-17), securing two AFC South division titles (2013-14). In his first stint with Baltimore, Pagano oversaw the Ravens' secondary (2008-10) before being promoted to the defensive coordinator (2011). Prior to his first Baltimore arrival, Pagano held various NFL roles with Oakland (2005-06) and Cleveland (2001-04) and coached collegiately at North Carolina (2007), Miami (1995-2000, 1986), East Carolina (1992-94, 1989), UNLV (1990-91), Boise State (1987-88) and USC (1984-85).

- Over his 35 years, Pagano has coached Hall of Fame S Ed Reed (both at the University of Miami and while with the Ravens) and several players who earned NFL All-Pro status: Reed (2003-04, 2006-11), CB Nnamdi Asomugha (2006), OLB Khalil Mack (2020), DE Robert Mathis (2013), P Pat McAfee (2014), DT Haloti Ngata (2011), LB Roquan Smith (2020), OLB Terrell Suggs (2011), K Adam Vinatieri (2014).
- During his tenure at the helm in Indianapolis (2012-17), Pagano led the Colts to two division titles (2013-14), an AFC Championship Game appearance (2014) and a 53-43 record (.552%)...Pagano's .552 winning percentage is fourth among all Colts head coaches, while his three playoff wins are also the fourth most in franchise history.
- Under his tutelage, the 2014 Colts became the first team (2014) since the 1970 merger to throw for at least 300 yards in eight consecutive games...Additionally, QB Andrew Luck threw for an NFL rookie-record 4,374 yards in 2012.
- During his time in Charm City (2008-11), the Ravens appeared in two AFC Championship games (2008 & 2011), ranked No. 2 in INTs (82) and No. 3 in passing defense (202.0 ypg).
- In his second season in Oakland (2006), Pagano helped the Raiders permit a league-low 150.8 passing yards per game...CB Nnamdi Asomugha thrived under Pagano's guidance that season, posting a career-high 8 INTs.
- With Pagano's coaching in 2001, Browns CB Anthony Henry became just the third NFL rookie since the 1970 merger to total at least 10 INTs in a single season.

10th), passing offense (262.6 ypg, tied fifth) and scoring (25.7 ppg, eighth)...QB Andrew Luck threw for 4,240 yards and ranked No. 5 in the NFL in both passing TDs (31) and yards per attempt (7.8)...With a career-best 91 receptions and 6 TDs, Hilton's 1,448 receiving yards led all NFL wideouts, earning him his third-career Pro Bowl nod...P Pat McAfee set career highs in punting average (49.3), net average (42.7) and longest punt (74 yards), en route to his second-career Pro Bowl nod. 2015: SS Mike Adams, CB Vontae Davis and Hilton all secured their second-straight trip to the Pro Bowl. 2014: The Colts posted an 11-5 mark, secured the AFC South division title for the second-consecutive year and appeared in the AFC Championship Game...Luck threw for a career-best 4,761 yards and a league-high 40 TD passes...The Colts produced the NFL's best passing offense (305.9 ypg), ranked No. 3 in total offense (406.6 ypg) and finished No. 6 in scoring (28.6 ppg)...Indianapolis also became the first team since the 1970 merger to throw for at least 300 yards in eight consecutive games...K Adam Vinatieri scored the league's third-most points (140) and connected on 96.8% of his field goals (30-of-31), finishing as the NFL's most accurate kicker that season...Seven Colts were selected to the Pro Bowl, and McAfee and Vinatieri also earned first-team All-Pro honors. 2013: Indianapolis captured the AFC South for the first time under Pagano, finishing 11-5 for the second-straight year...OLB Robert Mathis' franchise-record 19.5 sacks led the NFL, earning him Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors...Luck and LS Matt Overton were also selected to the Pro Bowl...After battling leukemia the year before, Pagano was the recipient of the George Halas Award, presented by the Pro Football Writers of America to an individual who overcomes the most adversity to succeed. 2012: Pagano was hired as the Colts head coach...In his first season at the helm, Indianapolis finished second in the AFC South with an 11-5 record...In September, Pagano was diagnosed with leukemia and took a leave of absence for 12 games...Luck threw for an NFL rookie-record 4,374 yards and 23 TDs to earn his first-career Pro Bowl Nod...WR Reggie Wayne registered 106 catches for 1,355 yards and 5 TDs, en route to his sixth-career Pro Bowl, while Mathis' 8 sacks were enough to earn him his fourth trip to the Pro Bowl.

MATT PEES is in his first year as the Ravens' assistant linebackers coach, bringing six years of NFL experience to Baltimore after serving in various roles with the Chicago Bears (2024), Atlanta Falcons (2021-23) and Tennessee Titans (2018-19).

- In 2024, the Chicago Bears defense ranked No. 2 in red zone TD efficiency (46.0%) and tied for No. 3 in red zone takeaways (5).
- Under Pees' tutelage, Atlanta's defense doubled its sacks total from 2022 (21) to 2023 (42), marking the largest yearover-year improvement (+21) by the Falcons' defensive unit since sacks became an official stat in 1982.
- Served as a defensive assistant/quality control coach for the Tennessee Titans in 2019, when the franchise made its first AFC Championship game in 17 years.

2024: (with Chicago) In his lone season as the Bears' defensive analyst-advance/special projects coach, Pees oversaw the NFL's second-best red zone TD efficiency defense (46.0%), a unit that recorded 5 red zone takeaways (tied for the NFL's third most)...Chicago's defense finished the year tied for the fewest first downs allowed (139) and tied for the fourth-fewest points allowed (151) in the second half/OT...With 129 tackles, LB T.J. His expertise has shaped new data applications within the organization, driving innovation in injury forecasting and personalized athlete development to enhance player availability, optimize performance and help drive team success. He works closely with the strength & conditioning, medical and sports nutrition staffs to help accomplish these goals.

In 2020, Rosengarten was invited to present his concepts on athlete management and injury prevention to the NFL Physician Society at the annual NFL Scouting Combine. Prior to his Baltimore arrival, Rosengarten led the NHL's Buffalo Sabres' injury-prevention program for two seasons. He is a board-certified physical therapist, a certified strength and conditioning specialist and sports physiotherapist in Australia and the United Kingdom. TRAVIS SWITZER (pronounced SWITE-zer) is in his ninth season in Baltimore and third as run game coordinator. The Ravens' ground attack flourished in 2024, led by RB Derrick Henry, who rushed for an AFC-best 1,921 yards and became the first player in NFL history to produce multiple seasons of at least 1,900 rushing yards. Since joining the Ravens in 2017, when he started his NFL coaching career, Switzer has worked his way up on the offensive coaching staff, serving in several roles and assisting with the wide receivers, tight ends and run game.

- In 2024, Ravens RBs led the NFL in yards per rush (5.6) and rushes of 20-plus yards (21), while also finishing Top 5 in rushing yards (2,210, third), scrimmage yards (2,814, third), total TDs (22, tied third) and rushing TDs (17, tied fifth) among all RB rooms.
- The Ravens' ground attack (2023) racked up an NFL-high 2,661 yards (156.6 ypg) and a franchise-record 26 rush TDs.

2017-24: (With Baltimore) 2024: Baltimore's running backs led the NFL in yards per rush (5.6) and rushes of 20-plus yards (21), while also finishing Top 5 in rushing yards (2,210, third), scrimmage yards (2,814, third), total TDs (22, tied third) and rushing TDs (17, tied fifth) among all RB rooms...The Ravens' ground attack posted a league-high 3,189 rushing yards (187.6 ypg), marking the second most in NFL single-season history (Super Bowl Era), trailing only the 3,296 yards Baltimore registered in 2019...The 5.76 yards per rush average is the best mark in NFL single-season history (SB Era)...Baltimore rushed for at least 150 yards in 13 games, tying its own mark in 2019, San Francisco in 1948 and Miami in 1972 for the most such occurrences in a season...Additionally, QB Lamar Jackson and RB Derrick Henry

combined for 2,836 rushing yards, marking the most by a QB-RB duo in NFL single-season history...Henry totaled an AFC-best 1,921 rushing yards, becoming the first player in NFL history to produce multiple seasons (also 2020) of at least 1,900 rushing yards...Henry also set franchise records in both total (18) and rushing TDs (16), en route to earning his fifth Pro Bowl nod. 2023: Promoted to run game coordinator...Baltimore's ground game racked up an NFL-high 2,661 yards (156.6 ypg) and a franchise-record 26 TDs...The Ravens backs posted 16 rushes of 20+ yards on the year, the NFL's second most...Unit posted the third-most rushing TDs (20) and the eighth-most rushing yards (1,696) among all RBs rooms, en route to an AFC North division championship and the NFL's best record (13-4). 2021-22: In an elevated role as an offensive quality control coach, assisted with the tight ends. 2019-20: Served as an offensive coaching analyst, helping guide the wide receivers group. 2017: Joined the Ravens' coaching staff in an administrative – performance role.

2015: (With Miami) Received a tryout invitation for the Miami Dolphins rookie minicamp as an offensive lineman.

"At the end of the day, it's all about the players. Whether you're a female coach or a male coach, your resume is what they do on tape," Rosburg said. "If you can give the players information or give them an advantage to help them win on Sunday, they will trust you, and they will respect you. If you're genuine, and you do things that will help them win and help them prolong their career, it doesn't matter what you look like. ... If you're real with them and you can help them, they'll trust you as their coach."

OZZIE NEWSOME's legacy is unlike any the game of football has produced. Simply put, "The Wizard" will forever remain in a class of his own.

Flourishing at every point of his football career, Newsome has not just followed a successful path, he has blazed the trail. Known throughout all of sports as a premier leader, Newsome is a Hall of Fame player, the architect of Baltimore's Super Bowl XXXV and Super Bowl XLVII championship teams and an elite personnel evaluator who became the NFL's first African American general manager in 2002.

(In 2019, Newsome's longtime top lieutenant, Eric DeCosta, took over as the Ravens' EVP & GM. However, Newsome maintains a significant role within the organization as its executive vice president.)

"If Ozzie wasn't already in the Hall of Fame as a tight end, they would be putting him in as a general manager," Hall of Fame GM Bill Polian stated.

"Ozzie is special as a person," head coach John Harbaugh states. "Obviously, he's great at what he does — that's proven. He's been great at everything that he's done. If you look at his history, he's a Hall of Famer; he's in every Hall of Fame there is and still counting. For me, it goes beyond that; it goes to who he is as a person — the type of husband he is, the type of father he is, the type of friend he is, confidant, advisor, just all-around good person with a great heart and a strong faith."

Newsome's remarkable football journey began in Leighton, AL, where he first stepped onto the gridiron with the hope of playing college football. That dream turned into a reality when he became a standout at Alabama under Bear Bryant from 1974-77. "Coach Bryant helped me grow up," states Newsome, who has a sideline portrait of the legendary coach and mentor on his office wall. "He pushed me further than I thought I could go, both on and off the field."

In 1978, Cleveland selected Newsome in the first round (23rd overall) of the NFL Draft. Playing 13 years for the Browns, he

authored the most productive career for a tight end in the game's history. A three-time Pro Bowler, his 662 receptions for 7,980 yards and 47 TDs stood as NFL records by a TE until Hall of Famer Shannon Sharpe surpassed those marks in 2001 (HOFer Tony Gonzalez now owns the catches and receiving yards marks, while Antonio Gates holds the TDs record).

Following his storied playing days, Ozzie joined Cleveland's front office. His initial non-player position came as an assignment scout in 1991. Two years later, he was promoted to a comprehensive role — assistant to the head coach/offense/pro personnel. "I had to find out which direction my career would go," Newsome explains. "Art [Modell] gave me the opportunity to work with the coaches, and I enjoyed that. At the same time, I increased my experience with the personnel department and decided that's where I wanted my career to head."

In 1994, Newsome was named the Browns' director of pro personnel. Although he continued to help on the field, Ozzie provided detailed studies on other NFL players and recommended which players the Browns should try to acquire. When the franchise moved to Baltimore in 1996, Mr. Modell invited Newsome and promoted him to vice president of player personnel. From that point, Ozzie's reputation as a supreme talent assessor grew quickly.

In the Ravens' first-ever draft, Newsome tabbed T Jonathan Ogden and LB Ray Lewis (fourth and 26th selections, respectively). Combining to produce an amazing 24 Pro Bowl honors, Ogden became the first Ravens' draft choice elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame (2013), while Lewis was enshrined in 2018. Fittingly, the duo joined Newsome, who was inducted into the Hall as a Brown in 1999.

Another top Newsome draft pick, S Ed Reed (2002), received a gold jacket in 2019, giving the Ravens three first-ballot Hall of Famers — all selected by "The Wizard."

Starting with Ogden and Lewis, Newsome consistently

compiled impressive draft classes for the Ravens. In the team's first 23 drafts (1996-2018) - all led by Newsome -Baltimore tabbed 24 first-rounders who have earned a total of 68 Pro Bowl honors. When the Ravens had a high pick, they didn't miss. Of the eight players chosen in the Top 10 by Baltimore, five (Ogden, OLB Peter Boulware, CB Chris McAlister, RB Jamal Lewis, the 2003 NFL Offensive POTY, and OLB Terrell Suggs, the 2011 NFL Defensive POTY) earned Pro Bowl accolades. Additionally, Baltimore picked in the bottom half of the first round with uncanny success: Lewis was twice named the NFL Defensive Player of the Year;

TE Todd Heap (31st) went to two Pro Bowls: Reed (24th) was chosen an All-Star nine times and earned NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 2004; QB Joe Flacco (18th) was named Super Bowl XLVII MVP, leading the Ravens to their second championship in 2012; LB C.J. Mosley (17th) became the first Ravens rookie to garner Pro Bowl honors after an exceptional 2014 season (and again in 2016-18); and four-time Pro Bowler QB Lamar Jackson (32nd) has twice been named NFL MVP (2019 & 2023), plus earned three first-team All-Pro nods.

Amazingly, in the Ravens' brief history with Newsome at the helm, he drafted 25 players who earned Pro Bowl honors in Baltimore. When including 2006 Pro Bowl LB Bart Scott, Pro Bowl K Justin Tucker (2013, 2016 & 2019-23), Pro Bowl LS Morgan Cox (2015-16 & 2019-20) and Pro Bowl FB Patrick Ricard (2019-22, 2024), who signed as rookie free agents in 2002, 2012, 2010 and 2017, respectively, Baltimore produced 29 homegrown Pro Bowlers under Newsome's leadership.

In addition to his knack for evaluating talent on the field, Ozzie has also mastered the ability to develop and

share insight with scouts who work under him. Over time, Newsome developed the Ravens' methodical and disciplined draft process, one that's foundation is laid years in advance. Now led by DeCosta, the "process" includes 28 members of the scouting department, but also has feedback from Ravens coaches. Much of Baltimore's staff has been with the team since the franchise started in 1996 or has graduated from the "20/20 Club," a group that consists of members who began with the Ravens as young assistants and grew into

evaluators with more input. (The term "20/20" refers to hiring "20-year-olds for \$20,000." "Actually, the guys started when they were a little older than 20 and for more than \$20,000, but that's what we call them," Newsome adds.)

DeCosta and Newsome, who is on the NFL's Competition Committee and the NFL Player Care Foundation Board, encourage all scouts and coaches to have strong opinions, noting specifically that they want to hear what everyone in the room has to say. Because of this philosophy, one of the biggest strengths of the Ravens' personnel team is that "we respect and listen to each other."

"We've been fortunate to have guys who cut their teeth right here in Baltimore, and our methods and philosophies have become engrained," Newsome affirms. "We have had great guys with Phil Savage, 'Shack' [James Harris], George Kokinis, Eric DeCosta and other people who were helping these young scouts along the way. I think that's the secret. It's the way we do things, and the way these guys gravitate to the process of the Baltimore Ravens."

With leadership from Newsome. Baltimore also fosters an environment that breeds standout coaches. By bringing in individuals who embrace the "Raven Way," Baltimore creates a synergy that manufactures success among scouts, coaches and players. As a result, the Ravens have had many assistants move on to become or return as head coaches, both on the collegiate and NFL level: Jim Caldwell (Lions), David Culley (Texans), Jack Del Rio (Jaguars/Raiders), Vic Fangio (Broncos), Kirk Ferentz (Iowa), Thomas Hammock (Northern Illinois), Pat Hill (Fresno State), Hue Jackson (Raiders/ Browns), Gary Kubiak (Broncos), Marvin Lewis (Bengals), Mike

Macdonald (Seahawks), Eric Mangini (Browns/Jets), Rick Neuheisel (UCLA), Mike Nolan (49ers), Chuck Pagano (Colts), Mike Pettine (Browns), Rex Ryan (Jets/Bills), Jim Schwartz (Lions), David Shaw (Stanford), Mike Singletary (49ers), Mike Smith (Falcons) and Ken Whisenhunt (Cardinals/Titans).

"[Ravens] guys love to play the game, and those are the guys you surround yourself with," states Ryan, who worked with Newsome from 1999-2008. "That's why you have a chance to be successful [in Baltimore]."

Graves School of Business and Management Honors Program at Morgan State University... In 2014, Newsome received the Leadership Award for career achievement at the John Mackey Awards banquet...In 2012, was honored with the Maxwell Football Club's Francis J. "Reds" Bagnell Award for outstanding contribution to the game of football...In 2007, along with Tony Dungy, Herm Edwards and Lovie Smith, Newsome received the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Johnnie Cochran Salute to Excellence Award, which honors African Americans in the NFL who make the biggest impact on the field and in the front office...Newsome was also honored with the award in 2009, 2011 and 2012... Now in his 35th NFL season, **GEORGE KOKINIS** is one of the longest-tenured Ravens in Baltimore's player personnel department. Kokinis, who was promoted to vice president of player personnel in 2024, is GM Eric DeCosta's chief personnel evaluator, overseeing all aspects of college and pro scouting for Baltimore. Kokinis began his NFL career with the Cleveland Browns in 1991, moving with the franchise to Baltimore in 1996. After advancing through the scouting ranks in the early seasons, Kokinis was named the Ravens' director of pro personnel in 2003 and spent six seasons at the post. He was hired to be the Cleveland Browns' general manager in 2009. As a longtime member of Ozzie Newsome's staff, Kokinis returned to the franchise in 2010, bringing a wealth of player personnel experience and knowledge back to Baltimore.

2010-25: (with Baltimore) **2024:** Promoted to vice president of player personnel following the NFL Draft...Under DeCosta's leadership, Kokinis oversees all college and pro scouting efforts. **2019:** The personnel department made 139 roster transactions that aided in a franchise-best 14-2 season for the Ravens, who earned their second-straight AFC North title...Named director of player personnel by new general manager Eric DeCosta following the NFL Draft. **2010:** Re-joined the team as the Ravens' senior personnel assistant.

2009: (with Cleveland) Named the Browns' general manager on Jan. 26, 2009.

1996-2008: (with Baltimore) **2003-08:** Kokinis became the team's director of pro personnel in 2003, overseeing all aspects of the pro football personnel department...In his six years as

Sarah Snyder, who's in her 10th year in the NFL, joined the Ravens in 2019 after three seasons (2016-18) with the Detroit Lions. She works closely with players, coaches, medical staff and performance teams to integrate evidence-based nutrition strategies into daily routines, with a focus on fueling, recovery and long-term health. She brings over 18 years of experience in performance nutrition, including five years in collegiate athletics at Florida and Michigan and four years with EXOS, a leader in elite athlete development. Snyder is the inaugural president of the Professional Football Registered Dietitian Society (PFRDS), representing NFL club dietitians. She also serves on the NFL General Medical Committee, helping to shape league-wide best practices in athlete care and performance. Snyder attended Santa

Clara University, where she earned a B.S. in combined science and served as a student athletic trainer. She later received a master's in human food and nutrition from Florida State, where she was also a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach.



O.J. BRIGANCE, a former Ravens and Baltimore Stallions (CFL) LB, is the Ravens' senior advisor to player engagement. Brigance, who has three championship rings - two Super Bowl rings with the Ravens (2000 and 2012) and a CFL Grey Cup ring with the Baltimore Stallions (1995) – has been an inspiration to the entire Ravens organization for his perseverance and courage while fighting Lou Gehrig's Disease (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis) the past 17 years. In June 2014, Brigance was honored by the Pro Football Writers Association with the George Halas Award, given to the NFL player, coach or staff member who has overcome the most adversity to succeed. The NFL has saluted Brigance many times, earning the Best Overall Player Development Program award for two-straight years (2005-06) and also receiving the Most Outstanding Internship Program Award in 2005. In 2007, the NFL once again honored Brigance's program, this time with the Outstanding Continuing Education Program Award. In 2008, the Ed Block Courage Award Foundation also saluted O.J. with its Johnny Unitas Tops in Courage Award for his strength in his battle against ALS. Brigance played seven years for three NFL teams (Miami, Baltimore and St. Louis) before joining the Ravens' front office in 2004.

2004-25: (with Baltimore) Supports the player engagement team in assisting all Ravens players with each phase of their careers...Brigance has made significant contributions to the Ravens' player development program, including organizing a number of player internships in high school football programs, financial institutions and real estate groups...The life skills programs O.J. provided to the players have been highly effective...Brigance's wife, Chanda, has also been very active with the organization, having spent a number of years as the Lady Ravens group facilitator...She coordinated the involvement of the players' and coaches' spouses and significant others with teamrelated events, including the Ravens' Family Food Drive and other charity functions and team-building activities...After being diagnosed with ALS (2007), Brigance has chosen to make the most of the opportunity by raising money and awareness for the fight against the disease...He established his own foundation, the Brigance Brigade Foundation (brigancebrigade.org), whose mission is to equip, encourage and empower people living with ALS...O.J. was the honorary chair of the Johns Hopkins University Packard Center for ALS Research's annual Fiesta 5K run six times (2008-13), helping raise over \$1 million in those six years...The Ravens organization supported O.J. each year, drawing the entire Ravens team in 2008 to run in the race...Brigance Brigade hosted the 13th annual 5.7K race in Baltimore in 2025 helping to support people living with ALS. **2013:** Brigance published a book, *Strength* of a Champion, sharing his incredible story. 2008: Brigance earned an Emmy Award as the host of the team's weekly TV show, Ravens Report. 2005: Lady Ravens participated in the team's Hurricane Katrina relief collection...Chanda has also organized seminars for the group on benefits, financial education and empowerment.

DR. ANDREW TUCKER has served as the Ravens' head team physician since 2001, following five seasons (1996-2000) in a role of team physician. In 2021, he was hired by the organization in a full-time capacity to be its first-ever chief medical officer. He has worked closely with Baltimore players since the team's inception, and prior to that, spent five years as the Cleveland Browns' team physician.

Dr. Tucker has accrued 35 years of experience providing primary medical care to professional, collegiate, scholastic and recreational athletes — also serving as medical director of the MedStar Health Sports Medicine program at MedStar Union Memorial Hospital.

Reporting to EVP & GM Eric DeCosta for all matters related to player care, Dr. Tucker oversees day-to-day player wellness. Even with his CMO position for the Ravens, he maintains his clinical practice at MedStar.

In addition to his role as the Ravens' CMO, Dr. Tucker has served on several NFL medical committees and most recently was Chair of the NFL Medical Committee, while he's also a past president of the NFL Physicians' Society.

Dr. Tucker's clinical research includes cardiovascular health and screening in athletes and sports concussion in pediatric and adult athletes. He is published in multiple medical journals and has written book chapters on a variety of sports health topics, including concussion, pre-participation examinations, and musculoskeletal injuries and disorders.

Prior to joining MedStar in 2004, Dr. Tucker was the director of primary care sports medicine at the University of Maryland Medical Center and an assistant professor for the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Maryland School of Medicine (1996-2004).

He also served as a staff physician in the Department of Orthopedics at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation and as an assistant clinical professor at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

After receiving his medical degree from Southern Illinois University, he completed two fellowships in sports medicine.

MICHELLE ANDRES, who joined the Ravens in 2006, is in her 20th season with the team after being promoted to senior vice president of Ravens Media in 2015.

She leads the franchise's digital media and Emmy Award-winning video productions departments, of which she is responsible for digital fan engagement — including social media, mobile, web, online sales, email, photography and television programming. She also oversees fan-centric digital technology like VR, AR, AI, CTV/OTT and more.

During her tenure with the Ravens, Andres has also led business intelligence initiatives, including fan research, analytics and data management.

Prior to working for the Ravens, Andres spent nine seasons with the NBA's Orlando Magic — seven in public relations overseeing corporate communications and government relations and two leading the franchise's newly-formed interactive marketing department.

Andres was a lecturer at Georgetown University's Sports Industry Management Graduate Program for four years (2013-16), teaching sports digital media and enhanced consumer engagement.

A native of Gainesville, FL, Andres earned her master's degree in political campaign management from the University of Florida and her bachelor's degree in political science from Furman University.



BRAD DOWNS, who is in his 24th season with the Ravens, was elevated to senior vice president of marketing in 2020. He leads the team's advertising, branding, game entertainment, fan development, promotions and partnership activation efforts. In 2023, Downs also assumed a leading role in "The Next Evolution," which is a three-year upgrades project to significantly enhance the gameday and year-round fan offerings at M&T Bank Stadium.

Under Downs' guidance, the team's youth initiatives were revamped, led by the creation of RISE, a first-of-its-kind youth football platform to encourage participation in the sport and engage with youth through high school football players. In 2023, the Ravens and Under Armour partnered with Frederick County Public Schools to provide grant funding and uniforms for the development of high school girls' flag football programs. The success of this launch has led to partnerships with Baltimore City, Montgomery County, Washington County, Calvert County and Charles County, also providing grant funding and uniforms for their high school girls' flag football programs. With 64 schools participating in 2025, girls' flag is rapidly advancing toward the ultimate goal of becoming a state-sanctioned sport.

Under Downs, the Ravens have been widely recognized as a leader in fan engagement, due in large part to the continued success of its Purple fan club for women, in addition to numerous

fan affinity programs that cultivate excitement and create topnotch experiences.

The organization's gameday experience has consistently ranked among the NFL's best, with 2023 yielding a No. 3 overall satisfaction score, including the No. 1 spot for game entertainment (according to the NFL's annual Voice of the Fan Survey). Downs also oversees the Ravens' premier pre-game destination, RavensWalk, which has routinely ranked among the league's best for pre-game entertainment outside the stadium.

Prior to joining the Ravens, Downs was a regional marketing manager with Adelphia Business Solutions, where a key part of his role was leading the naming rights partnership of Adelphia Coliseum when it was the name of the Tennessee Titans' home stadium.

In 2016, Downs was named one of Baltimore Business Journal's "40 Under 40" honorees, and in 2017, he was inducted into the Sport Management Hall of Fame at his alma mater, Robert Morris University.

Downs was a longtime board member of the Ravens Foundation, Inc. and currently serves on the board for The Family Tree in Baltimore. He and his wife, Amy, have two sons, Zachary (11) and Carter (9).



BRANDON ETHERIDGE is in his 10th season as the Ravens' general counsel, following a 2021 promotion to senior vice president. He is responsible for oversight of all legal, compliance and risk management matters for the Ravens. Etheridge also leads the organization's government affairs efforts and plays a significant role in the Ravens' social justice reform work, helping strengthen governmental, law enforcement and community relations. He is a member of the Maryland and D.C. Bar Associations.

Etheridge was instrumental in helping complete the new 2023 stadium lease agreement between the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA) and the Ravens that extended the team's commitment to remain in Baltimore and support investment in M&T Bank Stadium through the end of the 2037 NFL season, with two five-year options to extend.

In 2019, Etheridge advised on legal matters during the three-year, \$120 million M&T Bank Stadium improvements project, also coordinating with the Department of Homeland Security to help the stadium secure SAFETY Act designation. In 2018, he was instrumental in the administration and initial distribution of funds for the Ravens' Social Justice Fund.

From 2014-16, Etheridge was part of the NFL Management Council, providing counsel to teams on matters like the Collective Bargaining Agreement, player contracts, discipline and

healthcare. He also represented clubs in arbitration proceedings and advised on employment matters.

Prior to his time at the NFL, Etheridge worked from 2011-14 for the international law firm of Covington & Burling in Washington, D.C. He represented numerous clients in the sports industry, including the NFL.

Etheridge earned his Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Yale University, where he was also a two-time letterman as an OLB/DE. He then attended Harvard Law School, where he earned a J.D. in 2011. Born in Baltimore and raised in Maryland's Prince George's and Howard Counties, for much of his youth, he attended the McDonogh School, which is located just a few miles from the Ravens' training facility.

In 2014, Etheridge was named to *Forbes'* "30 Under 30" list as one of the "Sports World's Brightest Young Stars." In 2018, he was honored as a member of the *Baltimore Business Journal's* "40 Under 40" class, while in 2024 he was tabbed a *Sports Business Journal* "40 Under 40" honoree.

Etheridge serves on the Board of Trustees for the Baltimore Community Foundation and the McDonogh School. During the COVID-19 pandemic, he was selected by Maryland Attorney General Brian Frosh to serve on the Attorney General's COVID-19 Access to Justice Task Force.



SIMON GELAN, who was promoted to senior vice president of operations in 2024, returned to the Baltimore Ravens in July 2022 for his second stint with the club. In his first role with Baltimore, Gelan worked for one season (2009) in the operations department.

Gelan is responsible for directing the team's day-to-day operations, including at the Under Armour Performance Center, summer training camp and minicamps, team travel, team services, grounds, facility maintenance, game operations and food operations for players, coaches and staff.

Since rejoining the Ravens, Gelan has spearheaded multiple renovation/expansion projects at the UAPC, working to enhance employee office accommodations and creating a new premium performance & wellness space for the players.

Gelan previously spent three seasons (2019-21) as the director of team logistics and business process liaison for the Chicago Bears, where his responsibilities included home game operations, team travel, budgeting and master planning.

Gelan also spent nine seasons (2010-2018) with the Cleveland Browns in numerous roles, most recently as the director of football operations.

Prior to his 2009 season with Baltimore, he worked for the Chicago Bears (2008) and San Francisco 49ers (2007) in their respective equipment departments.

In June 2024, Gelan attended "NFL League of Leaders," which is an executive education program at the Stanford Graduate School of Business that brings together leaders from both the clubs and league office to accelerate leadership development among the NFL's senior level talent.

A native of College Park, MD, Gelan is a graduate of Morgan State University. He and his wife, Lywanda, have two daughters, Camille and Savannah.

JEFF GOERING, who joined the club in 1999, oversees the Ravens' finance and information technology departments. He also works with the team's insurance and risk management matters. In terms of financial operations, Goering leads the strategic planning, budgeting, financial reporting, tax and audit processes. He also serves as the primary financial liaison with the Maryland Stadium Authority, working with various stadium contractors. In overseeing the I.T. department, he focuses on matters such as hardware/software applications and network security/infrastructure.

Prior to being named SVP of finance in 2015, Goering served as the Ravens' VP of finance/chief financial officer (2008-14). He was elevated to senior director of finance in 2004 after spending five years as the organization's controller.

Previously, as a PricewaterhouseCoopers senior consultant in

Dallas, Goering worked with many sports entities, preparing financial feasibility studies, market assessments and economic impact analyses for proposed new or expanded sports venues.

He received his Master of Science in sports management from the University of Massachusetts in 1998. During that time, he also served as a consultant in the evaluation and preparation of Boston Red Sox salary arbitration cases.

Goering spent a year in the Philippines as a community development volunteer for the Presbyterian Church, USA, in 1995-96. He received a B.S. in business administration from Rockhurst (Kansas City, MO) University.

MOON JAVAID was hired by the Ravens in January 2025 to serve as chief growth and innovation officer. As a member of the organization's senior leadership group, he leads the business intelligence and strategy team, plus several other key business operations initiatives.

Prior to joining Baltimore, Javaid co-founded and served as managing director for international operations of Elevate — a global agency network helping 1,000-plus clients worldwide turn followers into devoted fans — from 2016-24. Under his leadership, Elevate developed cutting-edge insights and strategies across sports, entertainment and consumer products to drive fan engagement and growth.

Javaid spent 10 seasons (2013-22) with the San Francisco 49ers as chief strategy officer. In his role, he oversaw business intelligence, CRM and fan feedback, while also managing retail

Koppelman has worked in professional sports ticketing operations since 1987, selling Baltimore Orioles tickets at Memorial Stadium during the summer while earning his sports management and economics degrees at Guilford College (Greensboro, NC), where he graduated in 1990.

He worked his way to a full-time position with the Orioles in 1991, helping manage the stadium box office and contributing with the seating relocation from Memorial Stadium to Oriole Park at Camden Yards in 1992. He then spent a season with the San Diego Padres in 1995, before returning to his hometown to join the Ravens prior to their inaugural 1996 season.

Koppelman has helped M&T Bank Stadium and the Ravens host a Billy Joel/Stevie Nicks concert (2023), Metallica concert (May 2017), Beyonce's World Formation Tour (June 2016), Billy Joel

and One Direction concerts (both July 2015), Jay-Z and Beyonce's On the Run Tour (July 2014), and The Legends of The Summer Tour, featuring Justin Timberlake and Jay-Z (August 2013). Baltimore also hosted a U2 concert in June 2011, Monster Jam in June of 2011-13, a Kenny Chesney concert in 2008, international soccer matches between Chelsea and AC Milan (2009), Manchester City and Inter Milan (2010), Tottenham and Liverpool (2012), Arsenal and Everton (2022), FC Barcelona and AC Milan (2024), and the CONCACAF Gold Cup (2013 and 2015). M&T Bank Stadium has also hosted several premier college football games, including the annual Army-Navy showdown on four occasions (2000, 2007, 2014, 2016) and six NCAA Lacrosse Final Four tournaments (2003, 2004, 2007, 2010, 2011, 2014).

Koppelman is a graduate of St. Paul's School (Baltimore) and was inducted into its Athletic Hall of Fame in 2016 for his contributions as a team manager (football, wrestling and basketball) and a four-year member of the varsity baseball team. He is also a board member of the Baltimore chapter of the American Heart Association. Baker's wife, Reba, is the Ravens' vice president of financial systems & planning.



ELIZABETH MEARMAN joined the Ravens in 2004 and was promoted to senior vice president in 2020. Originally hired as the organization's first-ever director of human resources, Mearman designed, developed and implemented many of the HR methods currently in use for the team. In 2023, she led rebranding efforts to create the Ravens' People, Culture and Inclusion Department, further strengthening diversity, equity and empowerment for the organization's hiring and employee engagement practices.

For over 20 years, Mearman has been responsible for the leading strategy and operations for the people functions of the organization. She and her team direct and manage onboarding, benefits administration, performance management, compensation management, employee relations, organizational development and employee engagement, inclusion and satisfaction. In 2020, she was tasked with leading the Ravens' internal DEIB efforts to enhance team dynamics, productivity and innovation within the organization.

Additionally, Mearman partnered with several other NFL teams to

implement the first-of-their-kind NFL human resources meetings. The event has become an annual gathering, where HR leaders from nearly every team meet to discuss HR strategy, develop best practices and tackle issues that are unique to professional sports.

In 2019, Mearman and her team created/hosted the first-ever HBCU Career Combine, and in 2021, they took the Combine virtual when eight NFL teams participated to provide students from HBCU's a look into the world of working in sports.

Prior to the joining the Ravens, Mearman worked five years as an HR manager for the Allegis Group, a private staffing firm in Baltimore, MD. She holds her bachelor's degree in psychology from UMBC and her PHR.

Mearman previously served on the Board of the Ravens Foundation, Inc., and she currently serves on the Board of the Caring Cupboard in her hometown of Pasadena, MD.

Mearman lives in Millersville with her husband, Joe, their two children, Taylor (7) and Joseph (4), and their two rescue dogs, Charlie and Frankie.

KEVIN ROCHLITZ joined the Ravens in 2003 and was named SVP/chief sales officer in 2019. He leads the Ravens' corporate sales department, which includes national and regional partnerships, broadcasting contracts – including WBAL-TV, WBAL Radio and 98Rock – and M&T Bank Stadium suite sales.

In 2023, Rochlitz led negotiations for the substantial 15-year M&T Bank strategic partnership and stadium naming rights extension. In 2024, he helped create and sell the new Blackwing suites at M&T Bank Stadium, featuring 10 individual suites all connected to a private club that provides fans the NFL's most premium gameday experience. More recently in 2025, he led sales of the stadium's new Legends Suites, presented by T. Rowe Price.

Among other contracts completed by Rochlitz are partnerships with MedStar Health, Safeway, Visa, Coca-Cola, MillerCoors, Anheuser-Busch, Verizon, Southwest Airlines, Maryland Lottery and McCormick. He also led negotiations with sports gaming partners Caesars/Horseshoe Casino, BetMGM and Draft Kings. Additionally, at M&T Bank Stadium, he created and sold the Talon Pub, as well as the club level bars.

In 2014, he guided a sales team that completed a 10-year, \$60 million partnership extension with M&T Bank, including the continuation of the stadium naming rights and several community-focused programs. In 2012, Rochlitz coordinated a partnership with Under Armour, which led to the team's training facility being named the Under Armour Performance Center.

Rochlitz also spent five years as SVP of sales for Mandalay Sports and Entertainment/Mandalay Pictures, owners of the Dayton Dragons and Frisco Rough Riders. He coordinated the new stadium construction and sold naming rights for each venue (Fifth Third Field in Dayton, Ohio, and Dr Pepper Ballpark in Frisco, Texas). Steele is the organization's primary contact and spokesman for the team's communications efforts, and he directs strategic efforts promoting brand communication endeavors in coordination with football and business operations.

Steele and the Ravens' public relations department are three-time recipients of the Pete Rozelle Award (2010, 2012 & 2016), a prestigious annual honor that is voted on by the 300-member Pro Football Writers of America and given to the NFL P.R. staff that consistently strives for excellence in its dealings and relationships with the media. (The Ravens have also been finalists seven other times during Steele's tenure.)

Steele has been invited to assist the NFL's PR operations at six Super Bowls and currently serves as chairperson of the NFL's Football Publicity Committee. He was the first person ever chosen by the league office as a conference PR director for two-consecutive Pro Bowls in Honolulu, HI.

Originally a 1998 season-long intern with the Ravens, he rejoined the team in 2002 following three seasons with the San Francisco 49ers' media relations department. Steele also worked two training camp internships with the Carolina Panthers (1996-97).

Steele, who was selected to attend Stanford University's Executive Education Program for NFL Managers in 2005, was also asked by the NFL league office, along with veteran NFL players and team player development directors, to lead discussions on media professionalism with the 2007 NFL draft class. In May 2016, he was chosen by the University of Maryland to be the keynote speaker at its Communications School graduation.

Steele serves on the boards of the Irvine Nature Center, Sutton Scholars and Stevenson University Brown School of Business and Leadership. In 2024, he was named an Honorary Commander for the 316th Helicopter Wing at Joint Base Andrews.

Following 18 years as the Ravens' team president, **DICK CASS** retired on April 1, 2022. Throughout his impressive career, Cass made an indelible impression while overseeing all business areas for the Ravens, including finances, budgeting, non-football personnel, corporate sales, operations, communications and business ventures.

When Steve Bisciotti became the team's majority owner in 2004, his first hire was Cass as president. For the nearly two decades after, Cass provided a wealth of business knowledge, legal and negotiating expertise, philanthropic principles, and a calm and consistent leadership style.

Under his direction, Cass helped create the organizational culture for which the Ravens are known today. Toward the end of his tenure as president, he led the organization through challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic and worked at the forefront of the team's social justice reform efforts, engaging local and federal legislators to enact policy change. With roots deeply entrenched throughout the Baltimore community, Cass oversaw countless initiatives with the goal of creating better opportunities and circumstances for those most in need. An impactful presence on the board of the Ravens Foundation, Inc., Cass also served on boards for the Greater Baltimore Community Foundation.

Understanding the value of creating a world-class gameday experience for Ravens fans, Cass spearheaded multiple M&T Bank Stadium improvement/enhancement projects, reaching investment levels over \$200 million. Through these efforts, the Ravens have consistently ranked among the NFL's best in gameday experience, as recognized by the annual Voice of the Fan survey. Cass also led the construction and subsequent expansion, at a total cost of more than \$90 million, of the Ravens' Under Armour Performance Center,

which continues as one of the NFL's best training facilities.

From 2004-21, Cass helped guide Ravens teams that won five AFC North titles, clinched 10 postseason berths, appeared in three AFC Championship games and won one Super Bowl (XLVII in 2012). During his tenure, Baltimore produced the NFL's fifth-best overall winning percentage (.586), including the league's third-best mark at home (.713).

In 2023, Cass was inducted into *The Baltimore Sun*'s Business and Civic Hall of Fame, honoring the achievements of leaders who have spent their careers working to transform and improve Maryland.

Prior to joining the Ravens, Cass spent 31 years (1972-2003) as a partner at D.C.-based law firm Wilmer, Cutler and Pickering. He served as chairman of the firm's Business Transactions Section and was a member of its Management Committee. Some of his significant contributions to WC&P included: counsel to the Independent Commission of the US Olympics Committee (2003); counsel to the owner of the NBA's Charlotte Hornets during the team's relocation to New Orleans (2002); counsel to Steve Bisciotti in the purchase of the Ravens from the Modell family (2000 and 2004); counsel to the estate of Jack Kent Cooke in the sale of the Washington Commanders to Daniel Snyder (1999); counsel to Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones in the acquisition of the team and Texas Stadium (1980s); and advisor to the NFL in connection with the Collective Bargaining Agreement that brought free agency and a salary cap to the NFL (1992-93).

Born in Washington D.C., Cass graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Princeton in 1968 before graduating from Yale Law School in 1971. He and his wife, Heather, have two children: a daughter, Courtney (Ryland Sumner), and son, Willy (Madelaine), and three grandchildren.
